OFFICERS NAMED

Team Wants to Have Try Against the Chicago White Sox Here

Though but recently recovered from the scars of honor sustained in gridiron battles during the season of 1912, the high school athletes are already shaping for a strenuous baseball season, with a view of annexing all Panhandle trophies during the months of play.

Yesterday afternoon election of officers for the team occurred. Clifford Crotty was chosen captain, and Bob Morgan manager. Both men starred in gridiron togs, and both are eminently qualified to deliver large goods in their respective capacities. Crotty is said to be a nifty and puzzling twirler, and he will be backed up this season with a heavy and skilled aggregation.

A full line-up will be announced soon, following competitive try-outs of the various aspirants for position on the team. Manager Morgan said yesterday afternoon that the material to select from was excellent, and he expressed confidence that an organization would be shaped which would be able to put it over anything in this section of Texas, perhaps even further abroad.

It is the aspiration of this team to tackle the Chicago White Sox in the event that aggregation is brought here for an exhibition game, which seems daily more probable.

"We would hardly expect to defeat the Big Fellows," said Morgan, "even though we are ambitious, but we would consider it an honor to have opportunity to try issues with something of real large caliber. We have our eyes set on this match, and will shortly begin practice with a view of showing local fans something worthy of support and commendation."

Wealth of Athletics

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Seldom in the history of the national junior indoor athletic championships has there been such a wealth of runners, leapers and weight hurlers of high grade as are entered for the annual meet to be pulled off in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory here tomorrow night. Cities as widely separated as Boston, Chicago and New Orleans, with many of the intervening points, have sent their best performers to compete for the honors. Colleges and clubs alike will be well represented. Among the big colleges that will take part are Yale, Harvard, Cornell and Pennsylvania.

The list of events includes the 60 yards, 220-yards, 600-yards, 1000-yards and two mile runs, one-mile walk, 60-yards high hurdle race, standing high jump, standing broad jump, running high jump and putting the 12-pound shot.

In view of the many star performers included among the entries it seems almost certain that some of the marks in the eleven events will be displaced by better figures before the evening program is concluded.

IMPORTS OF ARABIAN WOOL SHOWS DECREASE

ADEN, Arabia, Jan. 3.—There was a great decrease in the shipment of goat and sheep skins from this country to the United States, during the year 1911 compared with 1910 and according to reports received from the United States. It was due chiefly to the interest that has been taken in the sheep raising industry of Texas. The increased production in that state has also affected the exports of other countries.

TEXAS EXPERIMENT STATIONS NEED FUNDS

COLLEGE STATION, Tex., Jan. 3.—One of the features of the fight that the Texas agricultural experiment stations are making for increased appropriation is a comparison of the advancement of Texas and Illinois in the work that is furthered by the stations.

It is pointed out that Texas, with an area of 262,398 square miles and a population of 3,896,542, appropriates nothing towards the maintenance of the main station, while Illinois, with an area of 58,000 square miles and a population of 4,000,000, appropriates \$138,000.

Texas gives but \$87,600 to the agricultural college while Illinois gives \$525,000. The federal appropriation for the stations is \$68,000 in each case.

TEXAS BARLEY CROP BRINGS \$137,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 3.—The barley crop in Texas has shown a phenomenal increase in the year 1912 over the previous one according to a report issued today by the department of agriculture. The 6,000 acres planted in 1912 produced 176,000 bushels and brought \$137,000. In 1911, 99,000 bushels of barley were raised on 5,000 acres and sold for \$84,000.

TEXAS MONEY FOR KENTUCKY FARM WAGONS

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 3.—A shipment of 700 car loads of wagons, requiring eighteen freight trains of forty cars each, is now en route to Texas, from this city. This is the largest order ever taken by the Kentucky Wagon Works and will bring \$700,000 into Louisville.

NEW EXPERIMENT STATION FOR TEXAS RECOMMENDED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 3.—The department of agriculture has abandoned its Plant Introduction Garden at Fort Brown, Texas, and recommends that this land, the value of which together with buildings, green-houses and equipment is more than \$300,000 be given over to the State of Texas, provided a necessary fund be appropriated by the state legislature to support an experiment station at that place for sugar cane and general farm crop investigations. To properly establish this work, it has been estimated that \$25,000 will be needed.

To Freshen Air.

To freshen the air of a sickroom, ground coffee should be sprinkled on a shovel or coal-scoop previously heated in the fire. A match should then be held to a small piece of camphor gum, and when this is alight it should be placed in the center of the shovel. The burning coffee gives an aromatic aroma to the room, which is very refreshing.

MINNESOTA LEGISLATURE MAY PASS 'BLUE SKY' LAW

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 3.—Members of the Minnesota legislature are already putting in an appearance in anticipation of the opening of the biennial session the first of the week. The general sentiment expressed by those already on the ground is that the session will be marked by the transaction of much important business. One of the first items of business will be the selection of a United States senator, but this will be a perfunctory task for the lawmakers, as the preferential vote at the November election assures the re-election of Senator Knute Nelson.

A presidential preference primary law is likely to be passed at this session, and the initiative and referendum and recall will be proposed in constitutional amendments. Other measures that are pretty sure to receive attention include an employers' liability law, "a blue sky" law, to prevent the sale of worthless stock, reforms in court procedure, amendments to the statewide primary law, and legislation providing for good road improvements, the extension of agricultural education, woman's suffrage and county option.

HIGHEST SCHOOL IN STATE

Old Stone Institution in Massachusetts Was Attended by Many Successful Men.

Peru, Mass.—On the roundabout road from Cambridge to Peru, Mass., the traveler passes an old stone schoolhouse built in the early part of the eighteenth century which is noted as the place where some of the most celebrated of Berkshire's famous men gained their education. This is the highest schoolhouse in the state of



Old Massachusetts Schoolhouse. Massachusetts, as it is built on land which is 2,200 feet above sea level. Close by there is a natural watershed where the water, when it rains, goes on one side into the Housatonic and on the other into the Connecticut rivers. It is the Bay state divide.


