



TOWN OF PAMPA YOUNG AND LUSTY

GROWS STEADILY AND SUBSTANTIALLY ALONG ALL LINES OF DEVELOPMENT

PAMPA, Texas, July 19.—Pampa, located in the northwestern portion of Gray County, on the Santa Fe railroad, is alike young and lusty—steadily and substantially growing from the creation of her first building.

The White Deer Lands, Not Too Dear And Yet, Very Dear

Pampa is built in the midst of one of the most fertile sections of the wide and famous White Deer lands, which, while not dear in price to the purchasing settler, speedily develops very dear farming values.

The Pampa lands are exceptionally noted for alkali proof and perfect wheat production and, also, fully meet the heavy yields of milo maize, Kafir corn, cane and other feed crops which are common to the Texas Panhandle and, therefore, give the Pampa region the dual distinction of breadstuffs and meat production.

Wheat
The Turkey Red and the Karkoff, a Russian wheat introduced a few years ago by the Santa Fe railroad agricultural department—are the principal Pampa wheats.

The Karkoff yields from 2 to 3 bushels more to the acre than the Turkey Red, while the Turkey Red yields out heavier than the Karkoff—the two wheats being about equal in their great flour factor.

Wheat harvesting is now in Pampa region progress, with three or four weeks yet to run and an estimation of the amount of wheat to be lifted this year from Pampa station ranging all the way from 150,000 to 275,000 bushels.

Macaroni Wheat

Macaroni wheat has been discarded from Pampa region sowings chiefly, it is said, from lack of culture knowledge. Macaroni is a non-stooling wheat and requires the sowing of two or three times the amount of seed per acre needed for stooling wheats. Instead of this, however, farmers of the region sowed this same amount of Macaroni per acre as they did of other wheats and, consequently, failed to secure a stand. There is no doubt, however, that if the Pampa farmer will treat Macaroni wheat right, the wheat will profitably return the compliment.

Another Elevator

Crossett & Co. are now removing from Tangier, Okla., a 10,000 bushel grain elevator and putting it up at Pampa. This gives the town, three elevators and a total elevator and warehouse grain storage capacity of over 10,000 bushels.

Milo and Kafir Park

The Pampa region is getting well started in the new and profitable direction of feeding, fattening and finishing hogs for export shipment to home produced milo maize and kafir corn, these hogs sometimes topping the Fort Worth market.

A Great Twin Gift

The Pampa farmer is just realizing common with all other Panhandle farmers—the full value of Old Mother Nature's great twin gift of milo maize and kafir corn gifts which include the following fortunate milo and kafir facts:

They are sure crops, a second crop can be raised on land which has already produced small grains, eat the and hogs eat them in preference to Indian corn and horses prefer them to oats; they maximum fattened and finish best and pork at a minimum cost. They are one of the best of poultry feeds; they furnish excellent and abundant silage, and in July they equal—until frost—alfalfa for hog pasturing, and are now developing an apparently limitless success as breadstuffs.

Waiting Leaves Mean Maturing Fats

The milo and kafir crops of the Pampa region are in excellent condition, there having been just enough dry weather, lately to more or less wilt the leaves of the plants—in connection with which is the well known milo and kafir farm axiom that "wilted leaves means maturing ears."

Meat

New farms continue to be rapidly added to the region—the White Deer Land Co., selling, since the first of this year, fourteen thousand acres of land to incoming settlers all of which will be more or less farm developed next year.
