EXCURSION COMMITTEE

BUSY ON COMING TRIP

Makes Slight Change In Dates and Other Important Announcements.

The Trades Excursion committee of the Amarillo Board of City Development is already getting very busy in the preliminary arrangements for the two day's excursion to the South Plains. On Friday about 50 return post cards were mailed out to Amarillo live wires and business men and more will be mailed out later.

The committee states that the hotel charges for the two days will not exceed \$2.00.

At a meeting held Friday morning it was decided to change the date to Wednesday and Thursday, August 12 and 13.

The committee already has over a list of names of persons who want to be on the excursion and who have sent in their names without waiting for a formal request. This action is very much appreciated by the committee, all of whom are as busy men as we have in the city.

Business men and others desiring to make the trip are asked to phone their names in immediately to any member of the committee, so that the time that might otherwise be spent in hunting you up may be spent in preparing for a more successful trip, for more and better entertainment, etc.

Uniform hats or caps will be supplied to the excursionists and this expense will be included in the amount collected from each member of the excursion for railway fare and entertainment.

Following are a few important attractions which will be a revelation to any Amarillo business man who has not already seen them.

At Post City, the famous cotton mills, the finest in the United States, will be visited. These are the only cotton mills in the entire country where the cotton is taken from the wagon, passed through the plant and comes out in the form of a completed sheet or pillow slip.

These are the only articles manufactured there and the product is of a very fine grade. There are many other things to see every step in the manufacture of cotton goods from the raw material to the finished product.

The main factory building is about 500 feet long and several hundred people are employed.

At Plainview, Lubbock and other points the great irrigation wells will be visited, some of them with a capacity of as much as 1700 gallons per minute, these great streams being poured on to the surface continuously from great underground lakes or streams some fifty feet below.

The names sent in already include many who were not with the excursion on Tuesday but are anxious for the South Plains trip. There ought to be 150 people on the trip, including the fifteen piece band and the names should be in early so that the proper arrangements can be made for transportation and other accommodations.

Following is a copy of the information that is being mailed out by the committee to our local business and professional men and live wires of whatever pursuit.

Dear Sir: Arrangements for another Trades excursion are under way. The itinerary is to include Canyon, Happy Trails, Kress, Plainview, Lockney, Phoydada, Hale Center, Abernathy, Lubbock, Halls, Lorenza, Crosbyton, Stanton and Post City. The excursion is to leave Amarillo on the morning of August 12th and return on the night of the 13th. All necessary arrangements for the comfort of the excursionists will be made in advance.

The cost of the trip, exclusive of hotel charges, will be approximately \$8.50 for each person, providing one hundred will join the excursion. To avoid much labor and save time, the committee desires that you sign and return attached stamped and addressed postal card at once, in order that we may know whether to proceed further with arrangements.

CONDITIONS FINE IN SOUTH PLAINS COUNTRY

Sudan Grass and Other Forage Crops in Excellent Condition Generally.

Jerry Minter, of the H. C. Harding Constellation Co. and Joe Speed have recently returned from spending a week on the South Plains making most of the trip by auto. They went as far south as Stanton and report conditions fine in most of the territory covered. It was especially true in the country to the west of Lubbock.

The Sudan grass in the Lubbock country is growing luxuriantly and will make an immense amount of seed and forage.

The calf crop in the South Plains country is excellent and prices are the highest ever. Early calves are in fine condition and some of the choicest stuff is selling at from \$5.00 to \$7.50 per head above last year's prices. The prices there were very high. Some sales have run as high as \$30 and \$32.50 for fall delivery. They found the country visited short both on yearlings and two-year-olds.
