

BELIEVES WOMEN WILL BE SOLID FOR PAT M. NEFF

Both use practically the same language—when he Mr. Thomson charged that Dr. S. P. Brooks of Waco took up with Mr. Neff over the phone the matter of sending a telegram to the Texas senators in Washington. On investigation I find that the telegram mentioned was not an endorsement of woman's suffrage, but was a message sent to the senators in regard to the defeat of the woman's suffrage amendment in Texas. Mr. Neff stated to Dr. Brooks at that time why he did not think it wise to send the telegram. J. T. Harrington, a prominent physician of Waco, who wrote the telegram, and Dr. Brooks who was the signatory, and both these gentlemen are bold advocates of woman suffrage, and are making speeches for Mr. Neff in his race for governor. They declare, and all who know Mr. Neff declare, that he has at all times and on proper occasions stood courageously for and advocated woman suffrage notwithstanding campaign statements by political enemies to the contrary.

When I consider Mr. Thomson's candidacy, I can not forget reading in the papers how valiantly he stood by Ferguson. Of course, he deserted him finally. But the House Journal shows that when the matter of his impeachment came up the first time, Mr. Thomson voted to give him a clean "bill of health." The next time, the matter of his impeachment was up, the line-up had been changed, but Mr. Thomson still remained loyal, merely voting to censure him for the "chicken salad" item. And not until practically every one had turned against Mr. Ferguson did Mr. Thomson leave him. He mentions that Mr. Neff was employed in the "chicken salad suit," but he does not state, which is a fact, that Mr. Neff was employed by a public servant of the people of Texas to file an answer for him in a legal proceeding to test out the constitutionality of the appropriation designed to cover the item of "chicken salad," and that Mr. Neff was paid for his services by the State of Texas to represent a state official, Comptroller H. B. Terrell. He was never employed by nor paid by Ferguson, I find upon investigation. I grant you the same privilege.

If the women of Texas do not wake up and rally to one of the candidates, Joseph Weldon Bailey is going to win this race. Mr. Neff is the only anti-Bailey man in the governor's race. Is it not true that Mr. Thomson and Mr. Looney have stood with Mr. Bailey on every proposition through

the years except his audacious campaign with them, to be governor of Texas? When they saw he wanted at the hands of the people of Texas what they wanted, they withdrew their support. Let's concentrate on Mr. Neff. Over 200 newspapers in Texas today are supporting Mr. Neff as "the strongest man" in Texas. Senator Bailey, Mr. Neff, from the unanimous resolution of the Democratic convention of McLennan county, where he has lived all his life, and is supported by such men as Judge W. E. Spell, Dr. J. T. Harrington and other prominent physicians. He champions the cause of the Texas Federation of Women's clubs, the Texas Congress of Mothers, and like worthy organizations of women, suggesting in his opening speech, delivered at Waco, Texas, last December, a legislative program for their advancement, that is masterful in its state-making outlook.

I feel that I could not conscientiously remain silent in the face of his race. Come on, let's vote for Pat M. Neff for governor.



