HARDING'S VIEWS ON LABOR DEFINED

TEN KILLED, 70 INJURED, WHEN 2 INTERURBAN CARS AT DENVER RUN TOGETHER

SPECIAL CAR LOADED WITH HOLIDAY PLEASURE SEEKERS COLLIDES HEAD-ON WITH REGULAR TRAIN RUNNING OUT OF BOULDER.

DENVER, Sept. 6.—Ten persons were killed and seventy injured when two interurban cars collided head-on, on a curve just outside of Globeville, a suburb of Denver this afternoon. Tonight all but one of the dead had been identified.

A special car on a train carrying a load of holiday pleasure seekers to Eldorado Springs, a well known resort, collided with a regular car returning from Boulder to Denver on the Denver & Interurban Railway.

According to officers in charge of the Globeville station, the conductor of the outbound car failed to obtain orders to wait at Globeville for the incoming car. The incoming car was two minutes behind schedule and was running at high speed to make up the lost time. When the cars struck they plowed into each other for a distance of fifteen feet.

Most of the casualties occurred on the inbound car, but few in either car escaped without injury.

At least two persons were killed when they jumped in an attempt to save themselves, according to T. R. Zarino, of Louisville, who was on the inbound car.

COX WORKS FULL DAY AT ST. PAUL

GOMPERS IS OUT IN BEHALF OF COX

MAKES SEVERAL SPEECHES AND "TAKES IN" MINNESOTA STATE FAIR.

ST. PAUL, Sept. 6.—Governor James M. Cox worked a full holiday here to day on what he termed his "pilgrimage to the Pacific Coast."

The Democratic presidential candidate made several speeches, viewed exhibits at the Minnesota state fair, where he drove a race horse around the track, attended several receptions and went to night to Minneapolis to close his Minnesota visit with another address.

Addresses Record Crowd.

Two extensive and several minor speeches were made here by Governor Cox. He addressed at the fair grounds what was said to be a record crowd for Minnesota and spoke to a large gathering later at the auditorium.

Agriculture and labor questions were the governor's Labor Day subjects at the fair grounds, and the League of Nations that of his public meeting here to night. A statement that he favored self-determination to Ireland was made at the latter meeting by the candidate in response to a question from a man in his audience.

"If elected president," the governor said last night, "will you recognize the Irish republic?"

Favors Self Rule.

"I am in favor of the application of the people of self-determination in Japan, in China, in Persia, in Turkey and in Ireland," was the governor's reply after a preliminary statement.

The rally drew loud applause and ended interruptions.

The governor presented his reply with a statement that the armistice was being on President Wilson's fourteen points" including that of self-determination and that article ten would protect such nations from external aggression-billing attacks of stronger nations," he said.

He added that nations should be limited from "racial groups rather than mountains and rivers."

INVESTIGATE CLUES IN CONNECTION WITH ROBBERY

DALLAS, Sept. 6.—Plans to connect with a holdup of eight men in a room in a local hotel Sunday, wherein it is reported the highwaymen secured \$20,000, were being investigated by the Dallas police tonight, with the word given that arrests were expected soon. The robbery occurred Sunday afternoon, when three uninsured men entered the room and took \$20,000 in cash from the eight men associated there and about \$30,000 in diamonds, according to report of the police.

Fourteen are Known Dead Result of Fire Burning Oregon Hotel

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 6.—Ten bodies tonight had been removed from the ruins of the Houston Hotel, which burned to the ground early today. Four other bodies had been located in the tangle of charred timbers, but because intense heat firemen had been unable to reach them.

Seven persons were being treated for burns and injuries suffered in jumping from the building.

Eight buildings in addition to the hotel were consumed and the property loss was estimated at \$300,000.

Firemen expressed the opinion that the bodies remaining in the ruins would exceed four, as they had seen what appeared to be portions of other bodies in the embers. Only four persons remained definitely unaccounted for.

NEFF'S PLATFORM WILL BE DISCUSSED AT MEETING TODAY

NOMINEE SAYS HE WILL MAKE NO EFFORT TO DICTATE ISSUES TO PARTY

MAY "LOSE LAND PLANK"

Definite Move to Discard This Feature Is Launched—Redistricting Project Is Being Freely Talked.

FT. WORTH, Sept. 6.—What the morrow will bring forth when the state democratic convention assembles, is tonight a matter of speculation and endless excusing in hotel lobbies and private offices in Ft. Worth, following the announcement of Pat M. Neff that he will make no effort to dictate the party platform. As a result of this statement a definite move, in which delegates from the Panhandle of Texas are taking an active part, has been initiated to drop the so-called Neff "Land Plank" from the shuffle, but whether the move will be successful or not and whether the candidate himself will endeavor to save this plank in the end, is still an open question.

Want Stinnett as Member

Hardly had delegates from the Panhandle delegation reached Ft. Worth before two well defined projects were taken up with delegates from every section. One of the means for redistricting of the entire state, at least so far as legislative officers are concerned, and the other is a movement to elect A. S. Stinnett of Amarillo a member of the state democratic executive committee.

It is learned on good authority tonight that one of the planks in the platform will call for redistricting the state and those who have been using the name of A. S. Stinnett, without his consent, for state committeeman, feel confident of success.

Largely Attended.

Indications are tonight that the convention will be largely attended, although having come from every section of the state. Two names to be mentioned are, being mentioned for temporary chairman of the convention, Luther Johnson of Corsicana, who is reported to be satisfactory to Mr. Neff, and C. A. Swinton, of Gainesville. It is also probable that the convention will hold a two day's session, adjourning Thursday, instead of a one day session, as at first expected.

Included among the delegates from the Panhandle are representatives Hill of Sherman, Mrs. Nellie Plastine, Judge W. F. Hendricks of Tularosa, Judge C. H. Earle of Miami, L. A. Wells and Sammer M. Ramsey from Amarillo.

Aviator Is Killed While Performing Stunts at Detroit

DETROIT, Sept. 6.—M. L. Timney, our army aviator, fell 500 feet to his death here today while performing aerial acrobatics at the state fair grounds. Timney's stunts were similar to those performed by Outer Locklear, who was killed several weeks ago.
