NEW RAIL CONFERENCE SET

MINERS OF PASTOR WHO Eloped WITH GIRL 7 STATES WILL BEGIN WORK TODAY

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 15.—Immense resumption of coal production in bituminous mines scattered over seven states was ordered tonight and in some places the cutting of coal will be started tomorrow. Orders for miners to return to work were sent by district union officials after operators had signed an agreement renewing the wage contracts that were in force when the men quit the mines last March 31.

The formal break in the strike came at 11:30 p.m. when the scale agreement was adopted by the unanimous vote of miners and operators at their joint conference. The general agreement then was signed by T. K. Maher, of Cleveland, an operator, as chairman of the conference and Wm. Green, a miner and its secretary. A supplemental agreement between operators and state union officials was then executed with the union chiefs wiring local unions that work might be renewed.

President John L. Lewis of the miners said that operators controlling an annual output of approximately 60,000,000 tons had signed the agreement. Their names he said were in West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Oklahoma and Washington.

Plans for extending the break of the strike also were laid by the union men. Frank Farrington, the Illinois miners' president, announced that he would ask the Illinois operators to meet the unions' district scale committee at Chicago on Friday. John Hessler, head of the Indiana miners asked the Indiana operators to join in a scale conference at Terre Haute on the same day. Van A. Buttner, statistician for the International union announced that operators in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas would be asked to meet with the union at Kansas City next Tuesday.

Under the policy laid down today by the union, operators will be required to accept the interstate agreements made at the general conferences here as the basis for their contracts with the unions. This agreement provides for the re-establishment of the wage contracts which includes the "check-off" of union dues that were in force last March 31, with the new contract to run until March 31, 1923. Further, the agreement provides for creation of an advisory fact-finding commission, a meeting being called of all soft coal operators for next October to effect the selection of the commission.

VARDEMAN LEADS MISSISSIPPI FIELD

The figures give: Stephens 33,991; Vardaman 29,354 and Miss. Kearney 9,841.

ALANREED TEST HAS GAS FLOW OF 2 MILLION FEET

WELL DRILLING AT 2,800 FEET AND OPERATIONS WILL CONTINUE

ALANREED, Texas, Aug. 15.—Harvey Well No. 1, came in here today with a gas flow estimated at 2,000,000 cubic feet. The well is drilling at 2,800 feet and announcement was made that the test will go deeper in search of oil.

Thousands of people came to Alanreed to see the well when news spread over the country about encountering gas. Visitors were permitted to go near the well about 2 o'clock this afternoon and hundreds took advantage of the opportunity. The well is one-half mile north of Alanreed.

Setting of eight-inch casing will begin tomorrow. It is planned to case off the gas and use part of it for fuel. The nearest test to the Harvey well is the Still, seven miles to the northeast.

Gas operators, Secretary Hoover stated, were breaking away from the voluntary fall-back agreements, except in some districts in Alabama and West Virginia and congress must set up checks advancing charges and at the same time authorizes the continuation of the federal distribution machinery, functioning by volunteer services which could continue indefinitely.

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Mr. Hoover indicated that about a week's study of the situation the effect of the Chevalier agreement on production, would be required before the necessary legislation could be framed.

Continuation of the federal distribution machinery would be necessary, Mr. Hoover said, especially to meet the anthracite situation. As soon as anthracite was available he declared, distribution of hard coal would be supervised by the federal organization along the lines now in practice for the movement of bituminous.

The first indication of gas was found several days ago when the well was around 2,850 feet in depth. Throughout the entire drilling the strata through which the well has passed has been practically the same as that of the producing Gulf Number one in Carson County.

At the present time the formation of the Smith number one is dark brown shale said to be the identical structure through which the Carson County well passed just before striking oil. The Smith number one has just passed through forty feet of saturation which contained a strong showing of oil.

The well is now being drilled by two ten-inch busters. Preparations are being made to change to eight-inch casing and to measure the actual amount of gas which the well produces. If the well continues in its similarity to the Carson Gulf number one, a good quantity of oil is expected to be found around 3,800 feet.

This is due to the fact that the altitude of the Smith number one is 2,34 feet lower than that of the Gulf number two.

The gas struck today was 220 feet lower than that found in the Gulf number two.

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
