THREE JURORS CHOSEN AS SCORES OF VENIEMEN ARE QUESTIONED

FIGHT MILLION DOLLAR SUIT WON BY MISSISSIPPI

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 13.—The supreme court of Mississippi today affirmed the decision of Chancellor V. J. Fisher imposing fines and penalties amounting to \$4,855,975 on about 130 fire insurance companies formerly operating in this state and against whom state revenue agent Stokes V. Robinson two years ago filed suit in the chancery court of Hinds county charging them with violation of the anti-trust laws of the state by conspiring to control rates. The supreme court in the state of Mississippi consists of six members and in the event of a tie, which resulted today, custom makes such a vote an affirmation of the case.

3,500 HOMELESS IN QUAKE ZONE

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 13.—The homeless at Capulhuo and vicinity number 3500, according to official dispatches, which do not estimate the number of dead from the earthquake and tidal waves. The suburb of Victoria has been destroyed. Latest dispatches confirm the quake's destructive work at Capulhuo and Chuan, the latter place being without food. Capulhuo is in dire need of medical assistance. Firemen and boy scouts are doing all possible to render aid to the destitute. The municipal theater and the principal church were among the buildings wrecked by the shock and nearly all the dwelling houses at Capulhuo were leveled.

GREAT BRITAIN TO PAY US 50 MILLIONS ON DEBT TOMORROW

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Great Britain has advised the United States that \$50,000,000 of the interest on her debt to this country will be paid tomorrow. It was announced today at the treasury. Great Britain made a payment of \$5,000,000 of interest on October 15 and officials explained that the \$50,000,000 interest payment would be subject to adjustment when the British debt funding mission reaches this country as the American debt commission is authorized to fund foreign debts at 4-5-4 per cent interest which interest is present is running at 5 per cent.

ALLIED TENSION OVER NEAR EASTERN SITUATION SLACKENS AS TURKS RECEDE IN DEMANDS

MADRID, Nov. 13.—The tension between the Allies and Turkey has slackened as the Turkish government has receded in its demands for the return of the Kertamis for greater control of Constantinople. Although no official announcement was made, it was stated in allied circles that after deliberations the Turks had agreed to accept the opening of the Lausanne conference.

TEST CASE IS AGAINST ORIENTALS IN AMERICA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Japanese race will be measured in the United States and can not become citizens of this country, the Supreme Court of the United States decided today in its first construction of Federal bearing on the subject. The decision was the first delivered by Justice Sutherland as a member of the court and was handed down in a case brought by Takao Ozawa, who in 1914 applied for citizenship in Hawaii.
