This is a serious matter. It is the first time party lines have ever been drawn in this county on a state ticket from top to bottom.

IN THE third (Park River) district Hon. Roger Allen was nominated for state senator, and John H. McCullough and A. M. Foss for representatives.

THE citizens of the Missouri slope should remember the grand republican rally at Bismarck on Saturday, the 21st, inst. Hon. John Miller, republican

nominee for governor, and Hon. H. C. Hansbrough, nominee for congress, will be present and address the meeting. Ex-Governor Pierce and other local lights are also billed for speeches, and as this will probably be the only rally in the city before election, all republicans who can attend should be present.

IF President Harrison wants a pension commissioner in every way qualified for the position made vacant by Tanner's resignation, he can do no better than to choose the Hon. John P. Rea of Minnesota—a gallant soldier, the ex-commander of the Grand Army, a thorough business man, learned in the law, experienced in judicial and legislative matters and conversant with the pension laws.
