**\$200,000 ENABLING ACT.**

It Provides a Way Whereby Our County May Build Many Miles of Roads.

CHAPTER NO. 362.  
Senate Bill No. 1257.  
Private Acts.  
Wilson.

AN ACT to authorize Cumberland County to issue \$200,000 of bonds for the purpose of constructing roads in said county and to levy taxes to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay said bonds and to provide for the appointment of Commissioners to sell said bonds and superintend the construction of said road.

**SECTION 1.**

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee, That the Quarterly Court of Cumberland County, Tennessee, be authorized and empowered to issue negotiable coupon bonds of said county in the sum of two hundred thousand (\$200,000) dollars at any regular or called session of said court, by a majority of a quorum of the Justices of the Peace composing said court voting therefor, said quorum being present.

The proceeds of one hundred and twenty-five thousand (\$125,000) dollars of said bonds, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be used in locating grading and constructing with suitable stone or other proper and suitable material, a road running northerly and southerly through said county by the county seat; and the proceeds of twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars of said bonds, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be used in completing the grade of the road running eastwardly and westwardly through said county and known as the Memphis to Bristol Highway; and the proceeds of fifty five thousand (\$55,000) dollars of said bonds, or so much thereof as may

be necessary shall be used in locating and grading other roads leading from and intersecting the two roads above specified. Provided that the bonds authorized by this Act, when issued, shall be issued for all purposes herein contemplated, at the same time.

**SECTION 2.** Be it further enacted, That said bonds shall be signed by the County Court Clerk of said County with his official seal affixed, and shall be issued in denominations of Five Hundred (\$500) dollars each, or some multiple thereof and numbered in the order of their issuance beginning with one.

**SECTION 3.** Be it further enacted, That said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum from their date until maturity payable semi-annually. Said bonds shall have coupons attached for each payment of interest, signed by the County Court Clerk, whose signature thereon may be lithographed, and numbered the same as the bonds to which they are respectively attached. Said bonds shall be due and payable in forty years from their issuance, and shall be redeemable at any time after twenty years from their issuance at par at the option of said county.

**SECTION 4.** Be it further enacted, That said Quarterly Court shall levy a tax each year on all taxable property sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay said bonds when due. The said Clerk shall keep a record of said bonds issued, and the numbers and amounts thereof, which records shall be open to the inspection of said court and the people of said county.

**SECTION 5.** Be it further enacted, That the County Trustee shall collect and account for the taxes levied under this act as he now does other taxes, and he shall receive one half the compensation therefor as now allowed by law and he shall pay said coupons and said sinking fund therefrom, and when he pays said coupons he shall cancel the same, and he shall receive credit therefor in his settlement with the county, and he shall keep a full and complete record of all coupons and bonds so paid by him, which record shall be open to inspection at all reasonable times. The sinking fund herein provided for may be used for the purchase of bonds at the end of twenty years as well as the same after maturity. And the said trustee shall have the power to require the trustee to give additional bond for the faithful performance of his duties and the faithful accounting of the taxes by him collected under this act.

**SECTION 6.** Be it further enacted, That for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this act, a Board of Highway Commissioners consisting of three members, who shall be good and suitable men, residents, citizens and freeholders of said county, and not members of the County Court, not more than two of whom shall belong to the same political party, is hereby created, with power to use said bonds in the construction of said roads. The following persons possessing the qualifications herein required to-wit: James W. Dorton, C. G. Black and J. A. Kemmer shall constitute the first Board of Highway Commissioners of said County under this Act. And said Commissioners are hereby given full power and authority to make, establish, promulgate and enforce such rules and regulations as in their discretion may be necessary, useful and practical for enforcing and carrying out the provisions of this Act, and for the purpose of constructing and building the roads as contemplated and provided for in this Act. Said Commissioners shall have the power to locate said roads to be constructed, to employ engineers to survey the same, and the said Commissioners shall make or have made reliable estimates of the costs of said roads, and they shall make or have made plans and specifications of the work to be done in constructing said roads, all of which work shall be done in a good and durable manner and on the best grade practicable, so as to reach the points determined upon in a reasonable manner, and said Commissioners shall advertise the work to be done under said plans and specifications, for said work to be done as a whole or as to any one of said roads as a whole, or as to any section or part of any one or more of said roads, or as to any part of the work of construction of said roads, or any one of them, and give the same to the lowest responsible bidder or bidders, with the option on the part of said Commissioners to reject any and all bids, but no bid shall be received which is higher than the estimate of said work made as hereinbefore directed, which estimate shall be made in detail showing the approximate cost of the work to be done, and which shall be done according to said plans and specifications; and said Commissioners may employ engineers, or other necessary aid to supervise said work under their directions. All work shall be done subject to the inspection of the Commissioners or engineers, employed by them, and all work not done according to the plans and specifications shall not be approved by the Commissioners; and the Commissioners shall require good and solvent bonds from all contractors, acceptable to said Commissioners, pay-

able to the State of Tennessee for the use of said County, and in a penalty equal to the contract price for the work, conditioned to satisfactorily complete the same and to carry out and comply in every respect with the terms, provisions and stipulations of the contract, the plans and specifications, and to save harmless said county from any expense incurred through the failure of the contractor to complete as specified and stipulated in the contract, plans and specifications such work, and against all claims of laborers, furnishers and sub-contractors. Said Commissioners may employ a competent person to act as bookkeeper and clerk, who shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by the Commissioners. The compensation of such bookkeeper and Clerk shall be fixed by said Commissioners.

**SECTION 7.** Be it further enacted, That said Commissioners are hereby authorized and empowered to institute proceedings in the manner now provided by law in the case of ordinary Road Commissioners to open and change the location of roads in order to secure better grades, and to condemn private property and assess damages for any changes that they may deem to be necessary in the location of said roads, said damages to be paid out of the proceeds of said bonds. They shall have the right to take, by gift of purchase, on behalf of said county, rights of way, stone, timber or other thing of value for the construction of the roads contemplated by this Act. They shall also have the right to avail themselves of any help proffered by any "Good Road Association" the State or the General government or any individual or corporation or Association or party. Said Commissioners and Surveying force shall have the right to enter and survey on any land in the County, the County thereby being subject to none but actual damages.

**SECTION 8.** Be it further enacted, That if the Commissioners herein provided for fail to receive acceptable bids for the construction of said roads, or any of them, or any part of them, or any part of the work, after advertising, they may re-advertise or they may buy, employ or hire such stock, tools, machinery, material, explosives, etc., as may be necessary and have the work or any part of it done by force account of day labor, by either free or convict labor or both. All contracts for rights of way and all contracts with contractors shall be in writing and shall be kept in a record book provided for in Section nine of this Act.

**SECTION 9.** Be it further enacted, That said Commissioners shall organize by electing one of their number Chairman and another Secretary, and shall keep in a well bound book a complete record of all their transactions, which book, on the completion of the work, shall be deposited in the office of the County Court Clerk and kept with other records of said County. Said Commissioners shall hold their office till the completion of the work provided for in this Act, but for insufficiency or culpable misconduct or incompetency or neglect of duty may, after five days' written notice by the presiding officer of the County Court, be removed by a two-thirds vote of said County Court. All vacancies on said Commission shall be filled by the County Court from persons of the qualifications hereinbefore provided. Said Commissioners shall keep a strict account of time engaged, services rendered, and expenses incurred, and shall certify to the same, and shall receive besides their expenses such compensation as the County Court may fix or allow for their services. They shall report to each term of the quarterly court the progress and condition of all of said work in detail and expenditures, and make final report on completion of the work. Two Commissioners shall constitute a quorum to transact business.

**SECTION 10.** Be it further enacted, That when said bonds are issued as heretofore provided, they shall be turned over to said Commissioners, they executing receipts in duplicate therefor; but before any of said bonds are delivered to said Commissioners they shall give good and sufficient bonds and faithful distribution of the proceeds of said bonds in the construction of said roads as provided by this Act in some reputable guaranty company as security authorized to do business in Tennessee, in an amount sufficient to cover the bonds turned over to said Commissioners.

Said Commissioners shall keep the funds arising from the sale of said bonds deposited with some National Bank at a reasonable rate of interest to be agreed upon by such bank and said Commissioners.

**SECTION 11.** Be it further enacted, That when the said bonds are turned over to said Commissioners they shall sell the same for the best price obtainable, but in no event shall they sell any of them below par and no commission or other charges shall be paid for the sale of said bonds.

Said Commissioners shall make reports in detail of the sale or sales of said bonds and of the disbursement of the proceeds thereof to said County Court.

**SECTION 12.** Be it further enacted, That none of said Commissioners shall in any way be interested, directly or indirectly through himself or his family, in any contract or contracts under this Act for the construction of any road or part of roads out of funds arising from the sale of bonds authorized by this Act, and any Commissioner violating this Section of this Act shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1,000.00 and imprisonment not less than six months in the county workhouse.

**SECTION 13.** Be it further enacted, That the Commissioners may pay the contractors each fifteen days upon estimates made by the engineers but they shall reserve 20 per cent of each estimate until the contract is completed and approved.

Day labor shall be paid for at stated times fixed by the Commissioners.

**SECTION 14.** Be it further enacted, That each of said Commissioners, before entering upon the duties of their office, shall take and subscribe to an oath, which shall be filed in the office of the County Clerk that he will faithfully and honestly discharge the duties of his office to the best of his judgment, skill and ability, and he will not be or become interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract for the construction of said roads or any part thereof.

**SECTION 15.** Be it further enacted, That the disbursement of the funds provided by this Act shall be done by checks, each signed by all of said Commissioners and having a voucher thereto attached, showing on what account the said payment is made, and each check and voucher, when paid and returned, shall be filed with the County Court Clerk with each report made to the Quarterly term of the County Court.

**SECTION 16.** Be it further enacted, That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act, be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this Act take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.
