JURY COMMISSION.

Takes Appointing of Jurors Out of the Hands of Justices of the Peace.

CHAPTER NO. 645.

Senate Bill No. 1400.

Private Acts.

(Wilson.)

AN ACT to create a board of Jury Commissioners in all counties of this state having a population of not more than 9240 and not less than 9220 according to the Federal census of 1910, or any subsequent Federal census.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee, That there shall be a Board of Jury Commissioners for each County in this state having a population of not more than 9240, and not less than 9220, according to the Federal Census of 1910, or any subsequent Federal Census. Said Board of Jury Commissioners shall consist of three (3) discreet men, who are householders or freeholders of the County, and have been residents of the county for at least three years and none of whom are county officials or attorneys at law. The Board of Commissioners shall be appointed by the Judge of the Circuit or Criminal Court in each county to which this Act applies and the term of their offices shall be for two years. The first Board shall be appointed the first regular term of the Circuit or Criminal court after the passage of this Act.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, That within thirty (30) days after the term of Court adjourns at which any Board of Jury Commissioners is appointed, it shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Court to notify in writing each member of the Board and set a

date not later than twenty (20) days from the date of the notification, on which day set by the Clerk the Board of Jury Commissioners shall meet at the Courthouse and take the following oath of office, after which they shall organize as hereafter provided: "We and each of us solemnly swear that as Jury Commissioners for _____ county, Tennessee, we will to the best of our ability, discharge the duties of the position to which we have been appointed; that we will not place on the jury list or suggest to any other member of the Board that he place on the list or agree to the name of any person being placed on the list whom we know, or have reason to believe or suspect to be unfit for the place, or who is corrupt, dishonest, or who is opposed to the enforcement of any of the laws now or hereafter enacted by the Legislature of Tennessee, or whom we have reason to believe or suspect would not vote for an indictment or conviction because of his opposition or dislike to any of the laws of the state; nor will we place on the jury list the name of any other person whom we know or have reason to believe or suspect would not discharge his duty as a juror, fairly, honestly and impartially. We will keep secret the name of any person whom we have reason to suspect desires to have his name placed thereon, and we will report to the court and Attorney General the name of any person who seeks either directly or indirectly to have his name placed on the jury list. We will keep secret all the lists made out by us, and the name of all persons suggested for the list or rejected, and all other matters pertaining to our business as jury commissioners, unless called on to testify to same in a court of this State. So help us God."

Section 3. Be it further enacted, That on the first Wednesday of each month preceding the month in which the regular term of court is to be held, as now fixed by law in the counties to which this Act applies, the Board of Jury Commissioners shall meet in the court room and make out from the tax books and other sources a list of thirty six (36) names of good and upright men, known for their integrity and common sense, and sound judgement, which list shall be the jury list. If there is no good reason for not doing otherwise, an equal number of names shall be selected from each District in the County in making out the list. The Secretary of the Board shall procure a well bound book into which he shall copy every jury list made out for any term of court. The book shall be so ruled that a margin will be left on the left hand side of the list of thirty six (36) names, constituting the jury list; and in this margin and opposite each name on the list shall be placed the initials of that Commissioner who suggested that name for the jury list. All of the Jury Commissioners present shall agree on the list; and if any member of the Board opposed the placing of any name on the jury list such name shall not be placed thereon. Each member shall file a list of twelve (12) names for the list; provided, always, the list of twelve (12) so filed shall be agreed on by the other members before they are placed on the list. If there is a disagreement, other names shall be substituted until finally an agreement is made. The list, when made out and agreed on, shall, in addition to being copied by the Secretary in the book for that purpose, shall also be copied on a separate sheet of paper and certified to as follows: "We _____, Jury Commissioners for _____ county, hereby certify that the foregoing is the Jury list made out and agreed on by us for the _____ term of court. This shall be signed and marked filed by the Clerk of the court." Section 4. Be it further enacted, That this list of thirty six (36) names so made out shall constitute the list from which the grand and petit jury of the term of circuit or criminal court shall be selected for which the list was prepared; and the selection of the Jurors from this list shall be made as is now provided by law for the selection of juries from the venire elected by the county court in such counties as this Act applies to. Section 5. Be it further enacted, That if a special term of court is to be held the judge of the court shall give notice in writing to the Commissioners to prepare a list of as many names as the Judge shall order. The notice from the Judge shall state the purpose for which the list is being made out, that is to say, it is desired for a special term of court, and that the court shall convene on a certain day setting out the day, and further giving the number of names desired for a jury list. This notice from the Judge shall be given at least thirty (30) days before the day for convening the special term. Immediately upon receipt of this notice and not later than ten (10) days the Board of Commissioners shall meet at the court house and prepare and certify to the list ordered by the Judge. This list shall be the jury list of the special term called by the Judge, and preceded with as all other jury lists. Section 6. Be it further enacted, That in the event any member of the Board of Commissioners, shall be unable to attend any meeting when a jury list is to be made out, he shall file with the clerk before court his affidavit setting out the reason for his failure to attend, unless his absence was on account of illness, in which event he shall file a certificate of a reputable physician, stating his physical condition. To wilfully, negligently, and without reasonable excuse fail to attend a meeting of the Board when a jury list is to be made out is hereby made a contempt of court and punishable by a fine of not less than fifty (\$50.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, and punishable by imprisonment in the county jail of not more than six months at the discretion of the court. Failure to qualify as a Jury Commissioner is hereby made a contempt of court and is punishable in like manner. Section 7. Be it further enacted, That in the event any member of the Board is absent from a meeting when it is the duty of the Board of Commissioners to make out a jury list, the other two members shall proceed to make out the list of thirty six (36) names and proceed with it as if he were present, only the name of the absent Commissioner shall not be signed to the list. Section 8. Be it further enacted, That in the event two of the members of the Board of Commissioners are absent and fail to attend, the members of the Board shall cause the Clerk of the Circuit Court to take before him the oath prescribed for members of the Board of Commissioners and they shall then proceed to make out the list of thirty six (36) names; and in the event the list is so made out it shall be the duty of that member attending to certify to the facts, that is to say he shall file with the clerk a statement setting out that he, being the only member of the Board present, administered to the Clerk the oath of Commissioner, and that they have made out the list. If the list is made out in this manner, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to certify to the list with that Commissioner present and for such service the Clerk shall be entitled to the compensation of a Commissioner. Section 9. Be it further enacted, That each Commissioner shall be entitled to receive the sum of two and 50-100 (\$2.50) dollars for each list which he helped to make out and sign; that in the event a Commissioner shall be unable to be present, he may file a list of twelve (12) names with the Chairman of the Board or Secretary, which list shall be accepted as part of the jury list, if neither of the members present object to any name on the list of twelve (12). In that event, only those names being approved by them shall be placed on the jury list. No member, however, shall be entitled to receive compensation for a list of names so filed unless he is present and signs the certificate appended to the

Section 10. Be it further enacted, That the Jury list when filed with the Circuit Clerk shall be kept secret by him; and none of the names on said list shall be divulged by him, except to the Sheriff of the County, to whom he shall deliver the list to be summoned as now provided by law; and it shall be the duty of the Sheriff to keep secret the names of the Jury list until he notifies the persons who are on the list which shall be done as now provided by law. Section 11. Be it further enacted, That all vacancies occurring in said Board, either from death, resignation or otherwise, shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments are made. Section 12. Be it further enacted, That all persons so named for jury service, shall possess the qualifications now prescribed by law, except that service on a regular panel within two years shall not disqualify a person from such jury service. Section 13. Be it further enacted, That the law in reference to special panels, as now provided, is in no manner changed by this Act. Section 14. Be it further enacted, That any person who seeks, directly or indirectly, to have his name placed on the jury list is guilty of contempt of Court, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine, of not less than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars and imprisonment in the county jail for not more than six (6) months at the discretion of the court and the grand jurors of the counties to which this Act applies are hereby given inquisitorial power—as to all offenses committed against this Act whether the same are specifically named or not. Section 15. Be it further enacted, That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are hereby repealed. Section 16. Be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

Be it further enacted, That the Jury list when filed with the Circuit Clerk shall be kept secret by him; and none of the names on said list shall be divulged by him, except to the Sheriff of the County, to whom he shall deliver the list to be summoned as now provided by law; and it shall be the duty of the Sheriff to keep secret the names of the Jury list until he notifies the persons who are on the list which shall be done as now provided by law. Section 11. Be it further enacted, That all vacancies occurring in said Board, either from death, resignation or otherwise, shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments are made. Section 12. Be it further enacted, That all persons so named for jury service, shall possess the qualifications now prescribed by law, except that service on a regular panel within two years shall not disqualify a person from such jury service. Section 13. Be it further enacted, That the law in reference to special panels, as now provided, is in no manner changed by this Act. Section 14. Be it further enacted, That any person who seeks, directly or indirectly, to have his name placed on the jury list is guilty of contempt of Court, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine, of not less than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars and imprisonment in the county jail for not more than six (6) months at the discretion of the court and the grand jurors of the counties to which this Act applies are hereby given inquisitorial power—as to all offenses committed against this Act whether the same are specifically named or not. Section 15. Be it further enacted, That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are hereby repealed. Section 16. Be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.
