Extra of the law governing the election for Major

That when the commission of Major shall become vacant, the Colonel, and if there be no Col the officer next in command in the said regiment, shall order each Captain or command of a company, to call to his assistance two of his subaltern officers, or other fit and proper persons to open and hold a poll at their respective muster grounds, giving forty days notice, by advertising in three public places in the bounds of their command; the said managers shall hold the poll on one day at their muster ground, from eleven o'clock in the morning until three o'clock in the afternoon, and shall meet on the battalion muster ground, or some public house near the same, on the day following, and count over the votes and declare the election.


