TENNESSEE NEWS IN BRIEF

Memphis—Representatives of Southern lumber interests met here in conference with John H. Kirby of Houston, Texas, lumber administrator for the South and vice-president of the Southern Pine Association, to perfect plans for the speeding up of timber production and delivery and to devise other measures to meet the increased needs of the government in its war program.

Selmer.—McNairy county is fast coming to the front in the way of improved and diversified farming. The support given Leonard J. Karr, county farm demonstrator, and Miss Florence Smith, home demonstration agent, is very encouraging.

Rockwood.—Five hundred citizens visited the home of Nelson Dale, who had been accredited with seditious utterances, and compelled the family to salute the American flag, apologize and desist from remarks in the future.

Huntingdon.—Red Cross donation day in this county, which was appropriately observed here, was a grand success. A crowd of 4,000 or 5,000 people was present and entered heartily into every feature.

Smithville.—The Bird S. Rhea farm, one of the noted farms of DeKalb county, has changed hands. The heirs of the late Bird S. Rhea sold this splendid farm to Edd Ragland of Cookeville for \$35,000.

Humboldt.—No stone is being left unturned by Gibson county leaders in perfecting the organization to put across in a hurry the sale of Gibson county's quota of \$371,700 in the third Liberty loan.

Nashville.—The club house of the Nashville baseball team was destroyed by fire. With the club house were destroyed 20 uniforms, balls, bats, gloves and other paraphernalia of the club.

Newbern.—The Dyer County singing convention will convene for a two-day session in this county at Beech Grove, four miles south of Fowles, April 13 and 14.

Chattanooga.—A large warehouse at the packing plant in Alton Park was burned with a large lot of hard, entailing an estimated loss of from \$12,000 to \$15,000.

Newbern.—A strong contest has been launched in Newbern between the Newbern high school girls and the Boy Scouts in the third Liberty loan campaign.

Jackson.—Fully 5,000 school children of the city and county participated in a patriotic parade here Saturday, the opening of the third Liberty loan campaign.

Bristol.—The Republicans of Sullivan county reorganized by the election of J. E. Miller of Indian Springs to succeed S. B. Gunning as chairman of the county committee.

HUNS DENT THE FLANDERS LINE

Germans Extend Big Battle North to the Ypres-Comines Canal. BRITISH RECAPTURE GIVENCHY Enemy Forces Way Into the Town Which is Later Retaken by Haig Men—French Stop Advance of the Foe.

London, April 11.—American reinforcements have appeared in the British battle zone, says a dispatch to Reuter's. Their presence should soon be felt, the correspondent says.

London, April 11.—In their new attack on the front north of the Somme battlefield the German forced their way into Givenchy, but the British recaptured the town, the war office announces.

Fierce fighting continued during the night on the front north of La Basse canal. The British troops are standing on the line of the Rivers Lawe and Lys and are engaged in heavy fighting with the Germans at the river crossings at Estaires and Bac St. Maur.

A German advance of four miles is indicated in the report of fighting at the river crossing at Estaires. Huns Extend Attack. The German front of attack is extending. Early in the morning a bombardment was begun on the British positions from the Armentieres region as far north as the Ypres-Comines canal.

On the southern part of this front infantry fighting is reported to have begun. The announcement follows: "On the front north of La Basse canal fierce fighting continued during the night. Our troops are holding the line of the Rivers Lawe and Lys and are heavily engaged with the enemy at the river crossings at Estaires and Bac St. Maur.

British Retake Givenchy. "On the southern flank of attack Givenchy, into which the enemy at one time forced his way, was recaptured later in the day by a successful counter-attack by the Fifty-fifth division, which took 750 prisoners in this area. Early this morning the enemy opened a heavy bombardment of our positions east and north of Armentieres as far as the Ypres-Comines canal. Fighting is reported to have commenced on the southern portion of this front.

"On the British front south of the Somme there was local fighting yesterday evening at certain points, without changing the situation. Dent in British Line. The text of the statement received from General Haig Tuesday night reads:

"After an intense bombardment of our positions from La Basse canal to the neighborhood of Armentieres, strong hostile forces attacked the British and Portuguese troops holding this sector of our front. "Favored by a thick mist, which made observation impossible, the enemy succeeded in forcing his way into the allies' positions in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapelle, Fauquissart and Cardonnere farm.

"After heavy fighting lasting throughout the day the enemy succeeded in forcing back the Portuguese troops in the center and the British troops on the flanks of the line of the River Lys, between Estaires and Bac St. Maur. Severe Fighting Continues. "We held our positions on both banks about Givenchy and Fleurbaix. At both these latter places there was heavy fighting, but the enemy was repulsed.

"Richebourg-St. Vaast and Laventie have been taken by the enemy. Severe fighting is continuing on the whole of this front. "South of Arras only minor engagements, in which were secured a few prisoners, have taken place during the day on the British front. French Lines Held. Paris, April 11.—German troops de-livered a heavy attack on the French lines near Hangard-en-Santerre, which was met by a French counter-attack, preventing the Germans from gaining any advantage, the war office announces. West of Castel and west of Noyon, German efforts to advance failed.

The civilian population of the city of Arras has been removed. For more than three years the city, before the war a place of some 25,000 inhabitants, held out under almost continuous bombardments by the enemy's big guns. It is situated on the Scarpe just behind the northern end of the main battle front. A city employee, who was charged with the care of the municipal archives and was unscathed during the three years of bombardment, was killed by a shell just as he was leaving the town after the archives had been removed.

WORKMEN SCORE POINTS. Freezing and sunstroke are both accidents within the meaning of the Minnesota workmen's compensation act, the state supreme court ruled. The Ramsey county district court was reversed on certiorari reviews of the cases appealed. George Rau, while working for the city of St. Paul on July 1, 1916, suffered a fatal sunstroke. His widow may recover under the compensation act, the court holds. C. N. Nelson, a juror, while shoveling snow from sidewalks, froze his big toe and the freezing resulted in amputation of his leg. The court held that he may also recover under the workmen's compensation law.

Chinese Workers Not Needed. The American Federation of Labor will oppose the passage of the resolution introduced in the senate by Senator Gallinger providing for the admission of Chinese farmers to supply the labor deficiency for the period of the war. The argument presented by the federation is that there is no shortage of labor in the United States, and that if shortage does actually exist in any particular district the trouble is due to inequalities in the distribution of labor. It is the position of the federation that redistributing will fill all shortages.

It is explained on behalf of the Chinese government that farmers sufficient to fill all needs would be sent over if the Peking government were satisfied that they could come without causing friction here. It has been the attitude of the Chinese government to wait the pleasure of the people of the United States, therefore, before making any move. No overtures looking to the sending of laborers or farmers have been made by Peking or the legation at Washington.

The greatest demand for the importation of Chinese farmers comes from California, where a great shortage of labor is anticipated. Another phase of the problem of labor anticipated in the production of foodstuffs on United States farms in 1918 will be 40 per cent greater than that of this year, according to official estimate. The farmers had difficulty in harvesting their crops last year because of labor shortage. Many are asking now what is to be done this year if the production is increased 40 per cent.

Ruling Important to Sailors. Assurance of a sufficient number of licensed men and mariners for the manning of the lake freighters is vouchsafed by a ruling of the United States provost marshal general, in which the winter status of a pilot or mariner on the Great Lakes is clearly defined.

It has been ruled in the case of a pilot or mariner on the lakes, the fact that his employment is interrupted by the closing of navigation, owing to weather conditions, does not prevent his exemption on the ground of being actually employed in the pursuit of his vocation, provided such registrant files with the local board having jurisdiction an employer's affidavit containing in substance the fact that the registrant was regularly employed during the past season and that his employment is contemplated for the succeeding season.

With the approval of the provost marshal general, the Lake Carriers' association has issued a form of affidavit for the pilots and mariners to file with their questionnaires.
