300,000 GREET FRENCH TROOPS IN STRASSBURG

Gen. Gouraud Leads 4th Army Into Beautiful Alsatian City.

FOCH TO ARRIVE TUESDAY

Soldiers March Arm in Arm With Happy Populace, While Every-where the Tricolor Blazes Forth Again.

Strassburg, Alsace, Nov. 26.—General Gouraud entered this city Sunday at the head of the 4th French army amid the tremendous enthusiasm of 300,000 people.

The ceremonial entry at which Marshal Foch will take possession of the city in the name of France and the allies is fixed for 1:30 p. m. Tuesday.

Pétain to Lead French Troops.

The solemn official entry led by Marshal Pétain promises to be anything but solemn. The inhabitants are impatient for the moment to arrive when they can acclaim the leaders of the victorious French armies.

A quick inspection of the de-Germanization of the town is proceeding with prodigious rapidity and is characterized by the frantic rechristening of business houses. Every few yards there appears a white cotton band with a French name that has hastily been draped over the German firm name or the German trademark.

Eliminate Auto Tax.

Strassburg Gay With Flags.

The enthusiasm of the French troops grew with that of the population as they advanced toward the Rhine, and when Strassburg was reached by the advance guard Sunday afternoon came the climax of the celebration.

Automobiles arrived with officers in advance of the troops and the officers were taken out and carried in triumph into the city.

March All Day in Capital.

All day Saturday they did the same and Sunday evening they continued by torchlight—long lines of horizon blue interspersed with the gay colors of the Alsatian costumes.

Today will take place at the cathedral a symbolic manifestation of this great historic event. The great clock at Strassburg will then be set to French time.

WILSON COMPLETES ARRANGEMENTS

PRESIDENT EXPECTS TO BE GONE SIX WEEKS—NAMES OF DELEGATES KEPT SECRET

Till Apportionment For Nations is Ready—Executive's Steamer May Carry 300 Persons—All News to Escape Censorship.

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Washington.—Complete arrangements have been made for President Wilson's trip to the peace conference. He will sail immediately upon the convening of Congress, and will be absent from the United States for not more than six weeks.

Among those in the Presidential party will be Ambassador Jusserand, of France, and Count Macchi di Celere, Italian Ambassador, both of whom have been invited by the President to be members of the President's immediate party.

The Administration let it become emphatically known that George Creel's impending expedition to Europe, perhaps as a member of the President's immediate party, does not mean that the press dispatches of American newspaper men, "covering the conference," will be censored.
