Epitome of Interesting Events That Are Transpiring Over the State

Nashville.—All towns in Tennessee are to be asked by the State Council of National Defense to pass stock ordinances to prohibit the running at large of live stock.

According to figures compiled in the offices of the state council there are approximately 1,000 head of live stock killed on the railroads in Tennessee every month.

Letters have been sent to locomotive engineers urging them to be doubly vigilant in the operation of engines; letters have been sent to the bankers of the state and to the superintendents of schools urging their cooperation...

Nashville.—State Geologist Wilbur A. Nelson returned from the upper part of the state, where his department, in cooperation with the United States geological survey, is engaged in oil and gas work.

A detail oil and gas structural map will be made by the party now in the field, showing the best locations for drilling. Two wells in the area embraced in Pickett, Overton and Clay counties have already been drilled and a fair amount of oil is being secured.
