FIREMEN GET SHORTER DAY

Threatened Strike at Cleveland Averted by the Granting of Arrangements for Overtime. Representatives of the firemen's union of Cleveland, O., definitely ended the dispute between the city and city firemen.

Under an agreement the firemen are to remain at work as a result of Mayor Davis signing a proclamation declaring the eight-hour day charter amendment adopted last November shall "be in full force and effect as of November 10, 1917." This means that the pay of the 600 firemen dating from last November is to be based on an eight-hour day, with overtime for every hour in excess of 8, 10, 1917.

GENERAL LABOR NEWS

Boston is establishing community markets in an effort to combat high prices. An advance of \$2 per week and an increase of 15 cents for overtime have been gained by Kansas City (Mo.) Bakers' union.

Agricultural workers in West Gloucestershire, England, are threatening to strike unless they are paid \$11.25 a week. In Sweden the trade unions have increased their membership 45,334 in a year. Of 186,156 members, 14,402 are women and girls.

Belfast shipbuilders have achieved a world's record in completing an 8,000-ton standard ship in 15 days after she was launched. Canadians are discussing the question of having aliens now in internment camps in Canada employed on the highways of Canada.

A large number of the employees of the Londonderry & Loughswilly (Ireland) railway went out on a one day's strike as a protest against conscription.

For the benefit of housewives who cannot leave their homes the Illinois food conservation department is using visiting housekeepers to go to them to teach the use of new substitute flours.

Right of approximately 600,000 employees in shipyards controlled by the Emergency Fleet corporation to organize trade unions and right of employers to form similar organizations is recognized by the corporation.

Desire for reform of the workmen's compensation laws of the state has led to the organization of smaller mine operators into the Arizona Mining Men's association, with Charles R. Reiniger of Tucson as president.

Seventy thousand miners of the central Pennsylvania bituminous coal fields have voted to work Sundays to overcome the falling off in production due to the Spanish influenza epidemic. Fuel Administrator Garfield announced.

Presentation of honor badges to 2,300 workers who made production records in the building of the wooden cargo carriers Folsom and Tolo was a feature of the launching of the twin ships at the yards of the Foundation company at Kearny, N. J.

Four large steel working plants that will entail an expenditure of \$15,000,000 will be erected in Duluth, Minn., at the termination of the war. This results from a recent conference between Duluth interests and Judge Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation.

Believing that shuttle kissing in cotton mills, an operation performed by weavers every two minutes, spreads infection and is largely responsible for the recent influenza epidemic, the Blackburn (England) Weavers' association has appointed a deputation to wait on the medical officer of health to discuss the subject.

Awards in controversies in the cases of ten street railway companies and their employees were announced by the war labor board. Wages were at issue in six cases, and in each increase were granted the men. The cities where increased wages were granted are Philadelphia, Kansas City, Portland, Ore., Dayton, O., New Orleans and Brooklyn.

Employees of the Chicago packing houses are demanding a minimum wage of 65 cents an hour. A conference of representatives of the workmen with the packers has failed to bring about a settlement, but efforts are being made to adjust the dispute without taking the matter to the war labor board at Washington, it was stated at the office of the Illinois Federation of Labor.

Approximately 450 Bay City employees of the Saginaw Shipbuilding company at Carrollton refused to go to work when the car which was to have transported them was late. At a protest meeting in Wenonah Park the men voted unanimously to return to work after they were appealed to by William Brennan, national organizer of the Shipbuilders of America, and were promised by Herbert Armstrong, representing the company, that they would not hereafter be docked when late because of transportation difficulties.

Skilled metal workers in Leipzig, Germany, get 32 cents an hour. A few pieceworkers earn as much as 47 1/2 cents an hour. To work at some essential industry or to work for the city at the work farm is now the only choice of the nonemployed able-bodied men at Duluth, Minn. This is the notice served on the mayor and the commissioner of public safety by Judge J. F. McDee, state fuel administrator, through instructions from the state public safety commission. The police began arresting men up to the age of fifty-five not employed in essential industries.

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BOLSHEVIK ARMY DEFEATED

Loyal Russian Troops Have Defeated Army and Captured 31,000 Prisoners. Washington.—Loyal Russian troops operating under the authority of the Omsk Government have defeated a large Bolshevik army, capturing 31,000 prisoners and large quantities of war material, according to a telegram from the Omsk authorities to the Russian Minister at Stockholm. The message as printed in the Swedish press was received at the State Department. The telegram said the third Bolshevik army of ten regiments had been shattered, and that the loyal troops had advanced beyond Kama and Noet and were pursuing the enemy toward Glasgow. Booty captured included armored trains as well as large quantities of war materials and reserve supplies. It was assumed here that the Russian forces referred to were those which recently captured Peru, a city in European Russia, near the Siberian line. More than 10,000 prisoners were taken in that engagement.

German Troops Prepare for Battle. Berlin.—At this hour Spartacan forces are being massed at several places where weapons and armored motor cars have been concentrated. In Wilhelmstrasse the Government forces are awaiting an attack. Government troops have been posted on top of the Brandenburg gate and adjoining buildings with machine guns. The troops in the Government buildings have been equipped with flame throwers. Shortly before noon the Associated Press correspondent saw a troop of about 80 Spartacans, half soldiers and half civilians, all armed and having with them one machine gun, march through the Potsdammer place toward the Bolshevik gathering place.

"Aces" To Start Flying School. Columbus, O.—Washington advices received here indicate that Captain Edward V. Rickenbacher and seven other American aces, who have either reached home or are on their way, have been called home by the Government to found a flying school, which will rank with West Point Military Academy and Annapolis Naval Academy. Other aviators mentioned are Major William K. Thaw, Captain Sanford Biddle and Lieutenant Tobin, who are already in the United States.

"REDS" TAKE PORT OF RIGA Bolsheviks Make General Advance in Old Russia—Capture 3,000 Prisoners and Booty. London, Jan. 8.—The port of Riga was captured at noon January 4, by the bolsheviks, according to a Russian wireless dispatch received here. In Estonia the bolsheviks are marching on Revel and have reached Charloff, about 30 miles east-southeast of Revel. A general advance by the bolshevik forces marching westward in old Russia is announced in an official report sent out by wireless by the Russian soviet government. The capture of numerous villages is reported. Lithuanian troops, the report states, have occupied Podbrdzie, about 30 miles northeast of Vilna. In the region of Stephanovo the bolshevik report they have taken 3,000 prisoners and considerable booty.

U. S. AIRMEN AT OYSTER BAY Flyers Maintain Vigil Over Home of Late Colonel Roosevelt and Drop Wreaths of Laurel. Oyster Bay, N. Y., Jan. 8.—High in the air over Sagamore hill army airplanes from Hazelhurst field maintained a ceaseless vigil, occasionally swooping toward the earth to drop a wreath of laurel among the elms near the Roosevelt mansion.

YANKS ARRIVE IN BERLIN Officer and Three Privates Will Take Photographs of Happenings in Capital and Vicinity. Berlin, Jan. 8.—Lieut. Arthur Sutton and Privates McCaney, Sues and Haston of the United States signal corps arrived in Berlin on Sunday from Coblenz. They will take photographs of happenings in Berlin and vicinity.

UPHOLDS PURE FOOD LAWS Wisconsin's Enactment Prohibiting Sale of Products Preserved With Benzoate of Soda Constitutional. Washington, Jan. 8.—Wisconsin pure-food enactments of 1909, 1913 and 1915, prohibiting the sale of food products preserved with benzoate of soda, benzoic acid and derivatives were declared constitutional by the Supreme court.

Memphis.—The board of missions, with the presiding elders of the Methodist church, met in Memphis. The Rev. R. A. Clark, D.D., of Covington, was elected missionary secretary for the conference. Dr. Clark will greatly aid in raising the \$35,000,000 called for for mission and church extension in the centenary drive.

Muirfreeseboro.—Fire, which originated in the first floor of the Y. M. C. A. building here for some time threatened the destruction of the business section of the city, and the Nashville fire department was called for help. The Y. M. C. A. building was completely gutted and the flames spread to two adjoining buildings, a cafe and a grocery, which were damaged to a great extent.
