LOCAL AND GENERAL.

The Royal Hawaiian Band will play this afternoon at the Immigration Depot from three to five o'clock.

The tug Wizard returned to the port of San Francisco on the evening of the 1st instant, after an unsuccessful search for the abandoned ship Cowden Law.

From reports received from Port Townsend, Washington Territory, we learn that the value of the lumber sent from Puget Sound district during the last six months of 1884 was \$119,897.

The bark Kale has been sold, and is no longer under the Hawaiian flag. The Iolani has also been sold, and it is not likely that we will see these favorite vessels in Hawaiian waters again.

The plans for the new water-works are now ready for inspection at the office of the Superintendent. Major Bender will be happy to give all required information regarding them.

Owing to indisposition General Van Buren will not be able to lecture next Thursday (to-morrow) night, but will do so at an early date of which due notice will be given.

It has been proposed to have the route of the parade of the Fire Department, which takes place to-morrow, extend up Fort street to School, through School and down Nuanuanu.

The annual meeting of the Trustees of the Sailors' Home will be held to-morrow morning at 10.30 a.m. The absence of Mr. Damon from their midst will be sincerely felt.

The health report of the city for January, which we publish to-day, has been a little delayed by the illness of Captain Brown; but we are happy to say that he is now about again, and the report is given.

The bark Mary Winkelman, Backus, sailed from San Francisco January 31st for this port. She brings an assorted cargo, valued at \$9164.—The barkentine Eureka has been placed on the Honolulu berth, loading at Mission 1 in the Hawaiian line.—The Eva has been withdrawn.

From letters received by the last mail, we learn that Piianai, who is at St. Chad's College, Denstone, England, is reported as "good" in general conduct, Divinity, French, German, Chemistry, and History.

The number of passports issued from the Hongkong Consulate to Chinese intending to return to this country was 429 since last March, when the regulation was published. The 93 who came in the Mariposa about completed the list, and included a number of women.

By the Nettie Merrill from Lahaina we learn that ex-Judge D. Kaniopili died at that place at 10 a.m., last Saturday. He was sick only three days. His Ex. J. M. Kapena, Mrs. Kapena and daughter were ready to return when they heard the news.

The Pacific Rural Press for January contains an agreeable letter written from here by a lady who is making a visit to the Islands. The letter contains a description of the ceremonies on the Queen's birthday, and gives the reader a pleasant idea of the island people. The Rural Press itself is full of instructive matter, more particularly connected with farming and stock.

By a late decision of the Collector-General, the new compound called "Celery, Beef, and Iron," which has hitherto been entered at the Custom House as medicine, and paid 10 per cent. duty, having been found to contain 33 per cent. of alcohol, will now pay the higher duty attached to spirituous goods.

Coconut oil also, that has always passed free under the treaty as a "lubricant" is found not to be used as such, but to be consumed in hair-oil, and will therefore pay ten per cent. duty.

Police Court.

BEFORE POLICE-JUSTICE BICKERTON. TUESDAY, FEB. 10.

Kao, a drunk, forfeited his bail of \$6. Kahawai plead guilty to the same charge, and was fined \$5 and \$1 costs.

Aye Yep was brought up on the charge of having some 24 tins of opium in his possession, which he had tried to smuggle ashore from the Mariposa yesterday. He was remanded until Friday.

Mr. Bennett, a fireman on board the tug Alert, which arrived yesterday, was arrested on the charge of trying to smuggle some 6 tins of opium ashore. The accused acknowledged that he had tried to get the opium ashore, but that he found it on board the Alert on the way down. He said that he was in destitute circumstances when he left San Francisco, and could not have bought opium there if it was selling for twenty-five cents a pound. His family, he said, were destitute when he left them, and though he knew he was guilty, he hoped the judge would be as lenient as possible. The judge said he would take the case under advisement, and remanded the accused until this morning.

Miguel, the hack driver who was complained of for heedless driving, was brought up for examination. After hearing the evidence of Professor Scott, who made the complaint, Miguel entered into a long explanation which was calculated to make his case a little worse than before, and resulted in having his license taken away, and a fine of \$10 imposed besides the costs, \$1.10. The judge took occasion to remark that this man had been up before him several times on complaints connected with his business as a hack driver, and now he was inclined to be impudent, which aggravated his offense. He had threatened to appeal from whatever decision the judge might give, and he would now have a chance to do so.

The Hawaiian Exhibit at New Orleans.

From a letter from Hon. J. Mott Smith we learn that he arrived at New Orleans on the 31st of January. He found there the Hon. Samuel Parker, and also found that the goods sent forward from here had arrived. It had been a somewhat difficult matter to find the exhibition officials, as they had two offices which were some six miles apart. However, our Commissioner had assigned to Hawaii the space originally set apart for San Salvador, which he says is centrally located and prominent. The weather had been very bad for the exhibition, rain falling in great quantities.

The exhibits were by no means all in place, but were arriving all the time. Those from Hawaii promised to make a good showing.

A Pacific Telegraph Cable.

The Washington Republican of Jan 20th has the following in its report of bills introduced in the House on the previous day:

"By Mr. Martin of Pennsylvania, to amend and revive the act of Aug. 15, 1876, to encourage and promote telegraphic communication between the United States and Asia. By this bill it is proposed—in view of the fact that several of the associates mentioned in the original act are now dead and some others are unable to join in the revival of this enterprise—to extend the incorporators named (among whom are Celso Cesar Moreno, O. H. La Grange, Frank M. Pixley, Amos J. Cummings, Leonard Myers, Phillip Chaves and others) a reasonable time within which to accomplish the work contemplated."

Editorially, the Republican speaks as follows: "The probable opening of the Panama and Nicaragua canal plainly shows the importance of quick and direct telegraphic communication across the Pacific ocean between the two continents of America and Asia. The Hawaiian Kingdom, by its geographical position, will be the intermediary point between said two continents, and under the rule of King Kalakaua, his Kingdom will become an important factor in the commerce of the world. Honolulu will hereafter vie with San Francisco, Yokohama and Shanghai for commercial supremacy as the clearing house of the Pacific. The bill introduced by Mr. Curtin yesterday is designed to promote the laying of a cable via Honolulu, and is a measure of decided importance."

The Blockade of Formosa.

[From the Hongkong Daily News.] The following notification from Vice-Admiral Courbet, Commander-in-Chief of the French Naval Forces in China, respecting the renewed Blockade of a portion of the island of Formosa, has been received from the French Consul at Hongkong, and is published in the Gazette:—

NOTIFICATION DE BLOCS. Nous soussigné Vice-Admiral Courbet, Commandant-en-Chef des Forces Navales Françaises dans l'Extrême Orient.

Vu l'état du répressif existant entre la France et la Chine, agissant en vertu des pouvoirs qui nous appartiennent,

DECLARATIONS. Qu'à partir du 7 Janvier, la côte de Formose comprise entre le Cap Sud (Lat. Nord 21.54, Long. Est 118.30), et Eyka (Lat. Nord, 24.23, Long. Est 118.13) dont le blocus avait été provisoirement suspendu, sera tenue de nouveau en état de blocus effectif par les Forces Navales placées sous notre commandement et que les bâtiments amis ou neutres auront un délai de un jour pour achever leur chargement et quitter les lieux bloqués.

La ligne délimitant l'espace soumis au blocus s'étendra à cinq milles de terre. Il sera procédé contre tout bâtiment qui tenterait de violer le dit blocus conformément aux Lois Internationales et aux traités en vigueur avec les Puissances neutres.





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
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
