Judge Austin was in former years a very energetic and athletic man, but he was seized with acute rheumatism several years ago. Health Report.

The health report for June last shows a total of 47 deaths as compared with the corresponding month of 1884. It is the highest June number since 1881, when the recorded mortality was 53. The annual death rate per 1,000 of population during June, 1885, was 28.30. Thirteen deaths were recorded 'outside' the city wards. Of the deaths, 19 were unattended. This appears to be a large percentage to be without medical aid. Thirty native Hawaiians died during June, of whom eight were under five years and five were over seventy. Eleven Chinese died during the month. Following is the stated cause of death: Aneurism, 2; asthma, 3; schooner Rosario arrived at Kahului on beriberi, 3; convulsions, 3; consumption, 8; disease of heart, 1; dropsy, 1; disease of spleen, 1; diarrhœa, 1; fever, 5; whooping cough, 1; leprosy, 3; old age, 5; opium 3; syphillis, 1; small-pox, 1; tumor, 2; onknown, 3; total, 47.






