DEPARTURE OF LEPROSERS FOR MOLOKAI.

Affecting Testimony to the Kindly Treatment Received at Kakaako.

By order of His Excellency the President of the Board of Health twenty-two male lepers were drafted out of the Branch Hospital Kakaako, to be transferred to the leper settlement on Molokai by the steamer J. I. Dowsett, which left at 5 o'clock last evening for that place. These unfortunate men were accompanied to the Immigration Depot by Deputy Marshal Dayton and Officer Tell. The President of the Board of Health was on the wharf at the time of their departure.

When the lepers had got into the boat which was to carry them to the steamer, they all stood up and one of their number, Kalua, a native of Maui, said he wished to express the feelings of himself and comrades in misfortune on their departure. Turning his attention to those assembled on the wharf he said: "I want you all to hear me. We go away with a sad disease on our bodies, but we do not go without hope. We are not sent away like prisoners. We have been dealt with very kindly, at the hospital we have left, by those righteous women. We go according to law. The President of the Board of Health, who is with us, has carried out the law mercifully. We go with obedient hearts in order to conform with the laws of our King and country, and with a hope that some of us may perhaps be cured. We have the hope of seeing the good officers of the Government at the settlement. Mr. Dayton and Officer Tell have carried out their orders very kindly. And now I propose, as we are not going away with oppressed hearts, but with hopeful ones, that we give three cheers for the King, the President of the Board of Health, the Government and those who have so kindly served us."

And then from a score of willing throats came three rousing cheers. The boat then moved off to the steamer and the unfortunates were taken aboard. As the steamer moved off on her journey they waved their alohas to those on the wharf. The scene was very affecting and one not soon forgotten. The cheerful spirit shown by these people in taking their departure was very apparent. They went away as if hopeful that the same care bestowed on them at the Branch Hospital would be shown them at the settlement.

Circuit Court—Third Judicial Circuit.

The September term, 1885, was held at Waiohinu, Kau, Hawaii, Mr. Justice McCully presiding.

The King vs. Manun Gerard, selling liquor without a license. Acquitted. J. W. Kalua and D. H. Hitchcock for defendant.

The King vs. Ah Co, selling opium. Appeal from Circuit Judge Lyman. The appeal was withdrawn and fine paid.

The King vs. Frank Gerard, selling liquor without a license. Verdict of not guilty.

The following divorces were granted: Emma R. Richard vs. T. S. Richard, Mohai (w) vs. Kalaui, D. W. Napiha vs. Kamaka (w). One divorce suit was continued until next term.

Special Commissioner to the Louisville Exhibition.

His Excellency John M. Kapena, Minister of Finance, has been appointed His Majesty's Special Commissioner to the Louisville Industrial Exhibition, and leaves by the Mariposa to-day for the Coast. His Excellency has not been in robust health for some time past, and it is to be hoped that the change of scene and climate will prove beneficial to him.

Great interest attaches to the Hawaiian exhibit at Louisville, and General Wright, the Superintendent of the Exhibition, has assigned it a very prominent place. The Government and planters have added largely to the original exhibit at New Orleans, which has been transferred to Louisville, and now forms a center of attraction there. Almanacs and printed matter descriptive of the Islands have also been forwarded by the Government, which has left nothing undone to advertise the productions and capabilities of the country in a suitable way. The presence of His Excellency, Mr. Kapena, as the Special Commissioner of the King, will increase the interest taken in these Islands by intelligent strangers, and should certainly be productive of good.

Captain and Mrs. Ayres, the Misses McAllister of Benicia, California, and Ensign Rodman are passengers for San Francisco by the Mariposa to-day. They all speak in terms of high appreciation of their visit to these Islands, and leave behind many who cherish sentiments of kindly regard and friendship towards them.

Decorating Female School Teachers.

On the recommendation of His Excellency W. M. Gibson, President of the Board of Education, it has graciously pleased His Majesty the King to confer the decoration of Companion of the Royal Order of the Crown of Hawaii upon Miss Corney, Miss Louisa Brickwood, Miss Mary E. Green and Miss Helen Carpenter, on account of their long and faithful services in the education of the youth of this Kingdom.

This distinction is well merited. Miss Corney has been a teacher in the public schools of Hawaii for twenty years, and Miss Brickwood for over eighteen years. Miss Green is well known for her faithful management of Wailua School, and the cause of popular instruction elsewhere. Miss Carpenter has been a very successful teacher at Makawao for over twelve years.

Concert at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel.

The Royal Hawaiian Hotel signaled its return to duty after a month's vacation by a grand concert at the Hawaiian Hotel last evening. The band was in excellent form, and the leader, Professor Berger, appeared to enter into the spirit of the performance. The programme, as announced in yesterday's ADVERTISER, was played with great success. The balconies, veranda and grounds were crowded with a fashionable and appreciative audience. Manager Graham had anticipated the occasion by providing a display of Japanese lanterns, which festooned the building in front from tower to basement with variegated light. The rear of the structure was also illuminated, and the grounds were lit up with torches. As a commencement of the musical season, nothing could be more successful than last night's concert.
