general appearance of the hospital. The

mann. The other business transacted
was of the usual routine character.

The following is the report of the House
Physician for the past quarter:
Honolulu, November 30, 1885.

To the Trustees of the Queen's Hospital—
Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit
the following report for the quarter ending
November 30, 1885:

The total number of patients at present
in the Hospital is 61, viz.: 36 Hawaiians
20 males, 16 females; 2 Chinese, 7 Japanese
and 16 of other nationalities; 24 paying.

The number of admission during the
quarter was 104; viz.: 43 Hawaiians, 25
males, 18 females; 6 Chinese, 31 Japanese
and 24 other nationalities.

Discharged 61; viz.: 33 Hawaiians, 24
males, 9 females; 2 Chinese, 30 Japanese
and 26 of other nationalities.

Deaths 15; viz.: 8 Hawaiians, 6 males,
2 females; 4 Chinese, 2 Japanese and 1
Portuguese.

The causes of death were as follows: Col-
lapse 1, cystitis 1, diarrhoea 2, dropsy 1,
hemorrhage 1, old age 1, paralysis 1, scro-
fula 1, syphilis 1, typhoid fever 2, beriberi 1,
and pneumonia 2. The last three died
within five hours after admission.

Sale of Awa Licenses.

At noon on Thursday the awa licenses
for the Island of Oahu were sold at public
auction, at the front entrance of Ali-
olani Hale. The following is the result
of the sale: Honolulu, first license, A.
Koo, \$1,200; second license, J. I. Dow-
sett, \$920. The upset price of each of
these licenses was \$500. Koolapoko,
Gim Yon, \$450; Waiaina, Hauka, \$160;
Ewa and Waiaina, Maile, \$375. The
upset of these outer districts was \$100.
The sale realized \$4,105, an increase of
\$635 over last year.

Domestic Produce Receipts.

produce for the week ending to-day:
