Hawaiian Botany.

EDITOR PACIFIC COMMERCIAL ADVERTISER:—I was pleased to see in Thrum's "Annual" for 1885, an article entitled "Helps to the Study of Hawaiian Botany" by Doctor C. M. Hyde. But an examination of the article was very disappointing. It swarms with errors. An enumeration of our common plants with the Hawaiian and scientific names is valuable for reference.

The Hawaiian name of the algaroba is "kiawe," and not "kaiwe"; and it is the Prosopis dulcis, a native of South America, and not the Ceratonia siliqua. The latter is the Carob tree, a native of portions of Europe, Asia and Africa along the Mediterranean Sea. Its pod has the flavor of the algaroba pod, and has different popular names, as Carob bean, Locust, St. John's bread, and its name in Spanish is Algaroba.

The Doctor has also much confused the Citrus family. Citrus medica is the citron, and not the lemon. Citrus limonum, not limonum, is the lemon, and not the lime. Citrus limetta is the lime. The Hawaiian name for the Bermuda grass is "manienie," and not maniana; and the scientific name is Cynodon dactylon. The "ohia lehua" is the Metrosideros polymorpha. I am unable to discover where the Doctor obtained the name M. tomentosa for this tree.

The "olona," Hawaiian flax, is the Boehmeria stipularis, or its synonym m, Urtica grandis, and not the Urtica argentea. This latter species is found in the Feejee, Society, Marquesas, and other islands of the South Pacific. The Doctor calls the silver sword the Argroxiphium macrocephalum. Mr. W. T. Brigham, in his "Hawaiian Volcanoes," refers to it as the A. Sandwiense, and I think he is correct. The Hawaiian name is "ahinahina."

Tamamu is the Southeastern Polynesian name of the Calophyllum inophyllum. The proper Hawaiian name is "kamani." This tree, a native of the Hawaiian Islands, produces a beautiful wood; and so its name is applied to what is fair and beautiful outside, and hence the term "hookamani" for hypocrisy. The Umbrella tree, also called "kamani," is an introduced tree, and is the Terminalia catappa. The "williwil" tree is the Erythrina monosperma, and not the E. coraloidendron. This latter tree is found in the Feejee, Society and Tongan Islands.

In addition to the above errors we notice the following misspelt words: Guayava should be guajava, Draecna should be Draecna, papaia should be papaya, Bronssonata should be Broussonetia, calyophyllum should be calophyllum, coraloidendron should be coralodendron, milikana should be "milikani," and palapalae should be "palapala."
I add a number of some of our common plants, both indigenous and introduced, which have been omitted by the Doctor. Hawaiian names are indicated by quotation marks. Plants having edible fruits and introduced are:

the Islands, and having showy or sweet scented flowers:
The Brighamia insignis, a Lobeliad, "ohaha," is found on the most inaccessible barren cliffs of Kauai, Molokai and parts of Maui. It has clusters of white and very fragrant flowers.

The Hillebrandia Sandwiensis, the only Hawaiian Begonia, is found in the deep valleys of most of the Islands. It has beautiful clusters of pink and white flowers.

The Viola Mauiensis has a delicate, sweet scented purple flower. It was first discovered by Rev. J. M. Alexander on the top of West Maui. The first manuscript description that appeared of it was under the name of Viola Alexandri. This name ought to have been retained. The Viola Kaulaensis also has beautiful, sweet-scented flowers somewhat larger than those of the Viola Mauiensis.

The Capparis Sandwicheana, Hawaiian caper, "maialipo," has a showy white flower, and is one of the most fragrant of Hawaiian flowers.

The Cassia Gaudichaudii, "ohai," produces clusters of beautiful red flowers. Other plants mostly indigenous to the Islands are: Solanum Sandwiense, "popolo"; Gossypium tomentosum, wild cotton; Sphaecela hastata, wild sage; Tribulus cistoides, "nohu"; Dodonaea viscosa, "ahi"; Rhus semialata, "sumach"; "neneleau"; Cassipoula Bonduc, "Kakalaia"; Zingiber Zerumbet, wild ginger, "awapuhi"; Euphorbia multiflora, "akoko"; Ipomoea Bona-Nox, "Koali"; Argemone Mexicana, "thistle," "puakala"; Sonchus asper, "pualele"; Helmia bulbifera, "hoi"; Osteomeles anthyridifolia, "uei"; Acacia Farnesiana, "Kolu"; Cassia occidentalis, "Kolomona"; Viscum moniliforme, Hawaiian mistletoe; Gunnera petiolata, "apeape"; Cyathodes Tancianica, "Kauai"; Plumbago Zeylanica, "hile." Among our most common ferns may be mentioned:

Sadleria cyathoides, "amaumau"; Sadleria pallida, also called Blechnum Souleytanum; Cibotium Chamissoi, "hapuu"; Cibotium Menziesii, "hi."
The above four are the only Hawaiian tree ferns.

Gleichenia dichotoma, "uluhe"; Davallia hirta, "palapalai"; Adiantum capilla-Veneris, "waiwai"; Marattia Douglasii, "pala"; Asplenium brevirostrum, "hoio"; the young leaves are used as a pot herb.
