MR. JUSTICE DOLE PRESIDING.

The S. S. Oceanic is to call here about September 11th on her way from San Francisco to Yokohama and Hongkong.

It is said that Mr. John Crowder will assume the duties of Port Surveyor August 1st. The new deputy is not yet named.

The name of Mr. La Nux, whose death was announced yesterday, was incorrectly printed. It should have been Pierre C. A. De La Nux.

Miss Gracie Hopkins, who plays "Little Lord Fauntleroy" is said to be a most wonderfully gifted child. Go and see her Wednesday evening.

The Legislative Assembly was opened yesterday morning at 10 o'clock with prayer by the chaplain. The House then adjourned for the day.

The Hawaiian Band gave an excellent concert at Emma square last evening. It plays at Thomas square this evening. Programme elsewhere.

Seats for the performances of "Little Lord Fauntleroy" Wednesday and Thursday evenings are selling rapidly at Mr. L. J. Levey's office where the box plan is.

This evening Harry B. Bell will benefit at the Opera House when will be presented a double bill, the comedy "Withered Leaves" and the farce "Our Family Help." Several amateurs will assist.

The S. S. Farrallon will sail at 3 o'clock this afternoon for San Francisco. The mail closes at the Post office at 2 o'clock. The steamer may arrive in San Francisco a few hours before the Australia.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Hoffnung will arrive from the Colonies on the next mail steamer en route to England. On June 14th they gave an elegant water picnic in honor of the famous comedian Mr. J. L. Toole.

The ship Harvester left Delaware March 24th with 907 tons of coal, and another vessel is on the way with 1000 tons, both consigned to the U. S. Consulate General. The coal is for the U. S. naval vessels.

Lui, the New Hebridean who was found guilty of the murder of Chas. Hiram, was up in the Supreme Court Monday morning for sentence. Mr. Justice Dole sentenced the prisoner to be hung the first Wednesday in November next.

Some very handsome and fine-toned pianos have been just added to the music department of the Hawaiian News Company. Among them are the celebrated Fischer so much sought after in this country. Call in at the store, examine and try them.

The large new steel British sailing ship Falkland lately arrived at New York from Calcutta on her maiden voyage. She is a monster four-masted vessel, and brought a cargo of 5600 tons, consisting of jute, saltpeter, catch and indigo. After discharging the Falkland will load 120,000 cases, or 1,200,000 gallons, of refined petroleum for Calcutta.

The new bark Albert, which was recently built by Hall Brothers at Port Blakeley for the George F. Smith Line, running from San Francisco to Honolulu, left there on the 15th inst. with a cargo of lumber for San Francisco, where she will receive her interior fittings. Her gross tonnage is 682. Captain J. M. C. Winding, who is part owner, will command the new craft.

Rumors reached Marshal Hopkins yesterday afternoon that a number men of-war's men belonging to the Charleston had threatened that they would "do-up" the Honolulu police force. An extra guard was placed at the Station House and the Marshal notified the Charleston. Only fourteen men were ashore last evening from the latter vessel.

The Auckland Herald says: The Zealandia is on her last trip to New Zealand and Australia, and will be replaced by her sister vessel, the Australia, which has recently been running in the Hawaiian mail service. The Australia has been undergoing a thorough overhaul and re-fitting, and will begin her new service to all intents and purposes a new vessel, while it is expected that the improvements being effected in her machinery will give her a speed of seventeen knots.

THE HAWAII RETURNS.

The Committee to Investigate at the Leper Settlement Complete their Labors—A Pleasant Trip.

The steamer Hawaii returned to port last evening about half-past 9 o'clock, having on board the Legislative Committee appointed to investigate at the leper settlement. The steamer left Honolulu Sunday night at 6 o'clock, and arrived off the settlement, after a rather rough trip, about 4 o'clock Monday morning.

The party had breakfast and went ashore at daylight, being received by Mr. T. E. Evans, the superintendent, and others. The committee went on with their work of investigation and the medical men on board spent the time in inspection. A number of the party took lunch with Mr. Evans. At 4:30 o'clock, Monday afternoon, the Hawaii left the settlement, arriving in Honolulu as stated above.

Medical Inspector Woods of the U. S. Flagship Charleston was one of the party and in a brief conversation with an ADVERTISER representative after landing, stated that he had enjoyed the trip very much. He visited the settlement fourteen years ago, but the improvements made since then are really wonderful. The people at the settlement, said Dr. Woods, are treated in the most generous manner and should have nothing whatever to complain of. He expressed himself as greatly surprised and more than pleased with the present excellent condition of the settlement.

Such remarks as the above coming from so distinguished a source, are very gratifying, and should satisfy everyone that the Government is taking good care of the unfortunate people at the leper settlement.






