Mr. Justice Dole left on the Claudine yesterday for Waimea, Hawaii, to hold a term of the Third Judicial Circuit Court. Deputy Attorney-General Creighton went to prosecute on behalf of the Crown.

Mrs. Lonise M. Berkley writes us from Melbourne, that she will be in Honolulu in December and remain a few weeks. During that time she proposes to introduce to the Honolulu public her daughter, Olive Berkley, who created the party of Little Lord Fauntleroy in Australia. She will appear as Juliet, Parthenia, Galatea, Little Nell and give readings. Miss Olive has taken the Colonies by storm.

NEW SAILORS' HOME.

Entertainment at the Y. M. C. A. Hall in Aid of Its Funds.

Yesterday evening an entertainment was given at the Y. M. C. A. Hall in aid of the new Sailors' Home Society by Mr. Francis M. English, B. A. (Oxon), which was attended by a very fashionable audience.

The Hon. Chas. R. Bishop, President of the Sailors' Home Society, introduced Mr. English to the audience.

The entertainment opened with a paper on Tennyson's "In Memoriam." Mr. English sketched Tennyson's life, and the causes that led to the production of "In Memoriam." He compared it with Lycidias and Adonias, and took as a specimen from it, Tennyson's treatment of religious doubt. Several amusing anecdotes were told of University life in England, and the paper was illustrated with copious quotations from the English classics. It was listened to throughout with the most marked attention.

After a brief interval, Mr. English gave a humorous musical sketch, entitled "Mrs. Sutherland Tomkins at Home." This kept the audience in one continual roar of laughter from beginning to end. Mr. English is an excellent mimic, a fine pianist and was most amusing in the way he took off the different guests who responded to Mrs. Tomkins' "at home" invitation. It is to be hoped that the sketch will be repeated on some future occasion. At the conclusion, the audience showed its appreciation of the entertainment by an enthusiastic burst of applause.

The foundation walls were changed from the original plans in regard to thickness and also the depth.
