REGATTA

IN HONOR OF HIS MAJESTY'S BIRTHDAY!

NOVEMBER 15th - 1890!

PROGRAMME--PART I.

YACHT RACES, 10 A. M.

1--YACHT RACE; FIRST CLASS. 1st Prize \$50; 2d Prize \$25; 3d Prize \$10. Open to all.

COURSE--1. From an imaginary line drawn from the Honolulu Harbor Light-house to the Immigration Depot Wharf on the east side of the harbor, out the channel, keeping between the Spar and Barrel buoys at the entrance to the harbor.

2. From the Spar Buoy, passing outside of the Bell Buoy, and tacking around a stake boat anchored in the bay, opposite the residence of W. G. Irwin, near Diamond Head.

3. From the stake boat, passing inside of the Bell Buoy, and tacking around a stake boat anchored off the reef, about half-mile south of the entrance to Pearl Harbor, at the point where the north end of the Waianae Mountains comes in line with an old house situated in a grove of trees.

4. From the stake boat at 9:30 a. m. tacking around the reef, and tacking around the Bell Buoy.

5. From the Bell Buoy, passing between the Spar and Barrel buoys, and finishing at the entrance to the harbor.

6. From the Can Buoy in the harbor to a White Flag on the O. S. S. Co.'s wharf.

2--YACHT RACE; SECOND CLASS. 1st Prize \$20; 2d Prize \$10; 3d Prize \$5. Open to all.

COURSE--1. From an imaginary line drawn from the Honolulu Harbor Light-house to the Immigration Depot Wharf on the east side of the harbor, out the channel, keeping between the Spar and Barrel buoys at the entrance to the harbor.

2. From the Spar Buoy, passing outside of the Bell Buoy, and tacking around a stake boat anchored in the bay, opposite the residence of W. G. Irwin, near Diamond Head.

3. From the stake boat, passing inside of the Bell Buoy, and tacking around a stake boat anchored off the Quarantine Grounds.

4. From this stake to and tacking around the Bell Buoy.

5. From the Bell Buoy, passing between the Spar and Barrel buoys, and finishing at the entrance to the harbor.

3--SAIL BOAT RACE. 1st Prize \$30; 2d Prize \$15; 3d Prize \$5. Open to all sail boats, belonging to the war vessels in port; no restriction as to rig; limited to wood or water ballast, or both; ballast may be shifted, but wood must not be jettisoned nor water started.

COURSE--Same as No. 2.

Yachts will assemble off the Pacific Mail dock at 9 a. m. A preparatory gun will be fired at 9:30 a. m. The starting gun will be fired at 10 a. m. sharp. The start will be a flying one; the time of each yacht, being taken as she crosses the line, but no yacht shall be allowed more than 10 minutes within which to start after the signal to start has been given.

Each yacht in races Nos. 1 and 2 must carry at her mainmast a head a distinguishing flag of a suitable size, which will not be hoisted down unless she gives up the race.

Each yacht shall carry during the race no other flags, pennants and chains, or for altering the trim of the yacht. No bags of shot shall be on board, and all ballast shall be properly stowed under the platform or in lockers, and shall not be shipped or trimmed in any way whatever during the race. Yachts in race No. 1 are limited to fore and aft sails only.

PART II.

ROWING RACES, 1 P. M.

1--SIX-OARED GIGS OR GALLEYS; stationary seat. 1st Prize \$55; 2d Prize \$25; 3d Prize \$10. Open to all.

COURSE--From starting line out the channel, leaving Spar buoy on port side, tacking to and around the Bell Buoy, keeping same on port side in rounding, and back to starting point, keeping Spar buoy on starboard side.

2--FOUR-OARED FREIGHT BOATS. 1st Prize \$25; 2d Prize \$15; 3d Prize \$10; 4th Prize \$5. Open to all.

COURSE--From starting line out the channel to Spar Buoy, keeping same on port side in rounding; keeping between the buoys in the channel, and back to starting point.

3--SIX-PADDLE CANOES. 1st Prize \$25; 2d Prize \$15; 3d Prize \$10; 4th Prize \$5. Open to all.

COURSE--From starting line to and around the Second Can Buoy to seaward from the Marine Railway, and back to starting point.

4--FOUR-OARED BOATS; sliding seats. 1st Prize \$10; 2d Prize \$5; 3d Prize \$3. Open to all.

COURSE--Same as No. 2 Rowing Race.

5--SINGLE SCULL SHUNT RACE. 1st Prize \$10; 2d Prize \$5; 3d Prize \$3. Open to all.

COURSE--From starting line to and around the Bell Buoy, keeping it on port side, and back to starting point.
