SHIPPING NOTES. The steamer Waialeale brought yesterday morning 2,720 bags sugar from Kilauea, Kauai.

The bark Albert has commenced taking in sugar for San Francisco.

The barkentine S. G. Wilder is on the Marine Railway receiving a new coat of copper-paint.

The schooner Liholoho brought 1,852 bags sugar on Sunday from Waianae, she sails to-day for Kauai.

The schooner Kawaiiani brought 500 bags paddy and 200 bags rice from Kooiaua January 4th.

The American three-masted schooner Alcide, Captain A. E. Smith, sails this morning for Kahului, Maui, to load sugar for San Francisco.

The Boston bark Wakefield will sail for San Francisco to-morrow. She will finish loading this afternoon.

The bark Forest Queen will sail from Kahului to-morrow with a full cargo of sugar for San Francisco.

The tern Mary Dodge is still at Kahului. After unloading lumber, she will load for San Francisco.

The steamer Mokoli'i arrives this morning from Molokai. She may leave again this afternoon.

The barkentine Discovery, Captain D. McNeill, will leave the Pacific Mail Steamship Co.'s wharf this morning for San Francisco. She will take nearly 800 tons of sugar.

The brigantine John D. Spreckels arrived at Kahului, Maui, December 31st, from San Francisco.

The barkentine Geo. C. Perkins was docked at the Fort Street wharf yesterday morning to discharge her 455,000 feet of lumber.

As the two men managed the sails, no one was left at the wheel but the little fellow, who bravely stood by and worked the wheel in whatever direction indicated by the men at the sails. For his noble action he was presented with a suit of clothing by Mr. Allen, part owner of the schooner. And well did the boy deserve the present, for few older lads would have had the courage to act as he did.

Pioneer Building and Loan Association.

The monthly meeting of this association was held Monday evening for the purpose of receiving dues and issuing stock of the second series. The association is only six months old, and any one knows what a building association is for and can do, can easily see that the Pioneer Association has done wonderfully well—all the shares, 1500, of the first series have been subscribed and about 1400 of the second series. Take almost any of the cities of the States, especially the Eastern states, and one will find that one-half of the houses, if no more, are built through these associations.

Fine Fruit.

Persons riding along Beretania street must have noticed near the dwelling house of Mr. Charles Hustace an orange tree covered with yellow fruit. On inquiry we find that it was planted eleven years ago, and this is the first year that it has borne any fruit to speak of. The crop has been about 300 fine and luscious oranges. It shows how readily this fruit may be propagated around our city dwellings to furnish fruit for the family. When fully grown, the crop will probably number a thousand oranges each year.

SUPREME COURT.

OPENING OF THE JANUARY TERM.

The January Term of the Supreme Court opened at 10 o'clock Monday morning with Justice McCully presiding.

The bar was represented by the following gentlemen: His Excellency A. P. Peterson, Attorney General; Mr. Chas. Croighton, Deputy Attorney General; Messrs. W. R. Castle, W. O. Smith, J. L. Kaulukou, A. Rosa, C. W. Ashford, W. A. Whiting, C. Brown, J. M. Davidson, F. M. Hatch, C. L. Carter, J. K. Kahookano, W. C. Achi, J. A. Magoon, S. K. Kane, W. F. Frear, Enoch Johnson and J. Mahiai. Mr. Henry Smith, Chief Clerk, was at the desk, while the veteran Captain Feilbehr guarded the mace.

Mr. Justice McCully, at the opening of the Court, said: "Gentlemen of the Bar, it has been decided to put into operation this Term the new statute for the trial of cases in two divisions of the Court simultaneously. All the criminal cases will be tried in this Court room as heretofore, and the Branch Court will try such civil cases as it is able to try which cannot be tried here, the Chief Justice being here this morning to assign such cases. We desire this morning that an arrangement of the cases may be made so that we will have our work laid out."

The Court then proceeded to call the calendar. The King vs. John Kamakia and Kelihoonano, the Diamond Head woman murder case, was set for trial Thursday.

The King vs. George Woolsey, as sault and battery, appeal from Honolulu Police Court, was set for this afternoon. It will be followed by The King vs. Iapeka, house-breaking, the defendant having pleaded not guilty.

James Shaw's appeal against conviction in the Police Court for assault and battery was withdrawn. The King vs. Wm. Joe et al, vagrancy, appeal from Police Court. A motion to dismiss the appeal is pending.

The King vs. Maikai, larceny. The case is struck from the calendar, the defendant failing to answer when called three times. The King vs. Maioa, rape. Defendant pleads not guilty and will be tried in due course.

The King vs. Chong Hin, unlawful possession of opium, appeal from Police Court. Defendant being called three times without answering, his bail is ordered forfeited.

Robert Pahau et al vs. Ipuhao et al, ejectment. Judgment for plaintiff as to portion of land disclaimed. Smith for plaintiffs; Thurston and Kane for defendants.

L. Ahlo vs. Aka, assumpsit. Abated by defendant becoming bankrupt. Castle for plaintiff.

Lau Hee Fan vs. Lau Shou, trespass on the case. Settled out of Court. Neumann for plaintiff; Davidson for defendant.

Len San vs. Lau Shou, trespass on the case. Settled out of Court. Neumann for plaintiff; Davidson for defendant.

Tong on Jan & Co. vs. B. F. Dillingham, winding up. Settled out of Court. Neumann for plaintiffs.

The Court will sit in banco, Wednesday, 21st inst.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Two cases were disposed of this afternoon before the native jury. The first case called was that of George Woolsey, who was tried for assaulting a Chinaman on October 9, 1889. The evidence showed that the youth had thrown two large stones at the Chinaman, the last of which inflicted a severe wound on the side of the head. Justice McCully in sentencing the prisoner, said the assault was unprovoked, and the appeal was unjustified. He, therefore, imposed a fine of \$60 and cost, being \$10 more than the judgment of the Police Court.

The second case disposed of was the King vs. Iepeka, for house-breaking. The evidence showed that the defendant had broken into a house near Kamehameha School. The testimony was complete and uncontradicted, and the jury gave a verdict of guilty without leaving their seats. The prisoner had a record of crime extending over sixteen years. Judge McCully thought that the safety of the public demanded that "habitual criminals" be confined to jail. The sentence was five years at hard labor.


