

SUPREME COURT CALENDAR.

Additional Cases from Last December Banco Term.

Paunahi et al. vs. Opiopio; controversy for right of way in Palolo. Davidson-Kaneakua for plaintiffs-appellant; Kaulukou - Makahalupa for defendant.

L. Ahlo vs. T. J. Hayselden et al.; bill in equity for accounting. Appeal from order of Doa, J., dismissing bill. Castle for plaintiff-appellant; Hatch for defendants.

Mohole Moanani vs. Rosina K. Manaku; bill in equity for injunction. Appeal from decree overruling plea in bar. Hatch-Brown for plaintiff; Thurston & Frear-Achi for defendant.

M. Rose vs. Administrator of the estate of D. Kalakaua; damage. Exceptions from October term. Hartwell-Smith for plaintiff-appellant; Hatch for defendant.

In re estate of Kealiahou; petition of J. K. K. for revocation of the will. Appeal from decision of Doa, J., overruling demurrer and plea in abatement. Ashford & Ashford-Hartwell-Carter for petitioner; Hatch for the pleas.

In the matter of request by members of the bar to fix a schedule of charges by the court stenographer for his transcriptions.

The Queen vs. Lui Self; maintaining lottery. Exceptions from order denying motion for new trial. Kaulukou for defendant.

Supreme Court Items. The January Term of the Supreme Court commenced yesterday morning, Judge McCully presiding. With the exception of assigning cases for trial, nothing of importance happened.

A libel case against John E. Bush was dismissed for want of prosecution. Four cases of housebreaking charged to "Barfooted Bill" were also dismissed, for the reason that the Attorney-General thought the present sentence to be served by the notorious burglar was punishment enough.

An individual named L. Hoapili charged with vagrancy was also allowed to go without trial.

Kerna and Laioha, charged with maintaining a lottery, plead guilty and asked for leniency on the part of the Court. They were fined \$100 each and costs.

A number of defendants were arraigned and pleaded. The Court adjourned until this morning.

The following is an extract of a letter sent from San Francisco:

"It is with pride that I inform you of the advancement of some Honolulu boys abroad, who were taught and trained in our schools. Master Robert Isaac Moore, who attended Fort street school for six years under Prof. M. M. Scott, has just graduated from the University of California College of Dentistry, out of a senior class of thirty-three members. He has, at the final examinations, proved himself to be one of the profoundest students, a splendid operator and the best mechanical workman of the graduating class, coming out number one. This has been conceded him by his classmates, as the faculty have ruled not to make distinction. According to Dr. Moore's own words, he owes his success more to Prof. M. M. Scott's early teachings and his ever kind encouragement than to anything else.
