RIOTING IN BERLIN.

Over One Hundred Persons
Arrested.

Popular Excitement Caused by the
Emperor's Vigorous Speech.

BERLIN, Feb. 24.-At a banquet given in Brandenburg to-day, Emperor William blamed the critics of his policy as enemies of the state. He urged all who loved the Fatherland to follow in his steps, expressing the confidence that he would lead the country on to glorious days, and giving utterance to the wish that the discontented persons would shake the dust of Germany from their feet.

BERLIN, Feb. 25.-The Emperor's speech at the Brandenburg banquet yesterday caused a sensation. At 10 o'clock this morning about 5000 unemployed men met in the suburb of Friedrichshain under socialist auspices.

Violent speeches were made. One man called on the crowd to go to Berlin, inciting shouted responses of "We will go" and "The Kaiser must see us." Resolutions denouncing the Emperor and the system of government which enabled him to crush labor were passed.

The socialists took advantage of the occasion for a demonstration, joined the workmen and marched through the streets crying "on to the palace." At Unter den Linden in front of the statue of Frederick the Great an agitator spoke, arousing the crowd to desperation, who took up the march toward the castle singing the "Marseillaise."

The procession reached up Koenig strasse and past the Town Hall to the Schloss Platz square, on which stands the imperial castle. Here the crowd shouted their demands for bread, and their attitude was so threatening that the police sent for re-enforcements. Being strengthened by the arrival of aid the police drew their sabres and tried to disperse the crowd, but the clamorous people resisted, making use of clubs they carried.

The police were unable at first to stem the progress and were swept out of the way by the surging masses, but they rallied and made a bold and successful stand, using their clubs. The mob was

stunned, defeated, and finally dispersed in a panic. It is estimated that seventy rioters were disabled and left on the streets. They were cared for by the authorities and removed to the hospitals. One hundred others were taken prisoners. There is wild excitement in the city.

During the evening hundreds of unemployed persons carried by storm the butchers' and bakers' shops in the Koepenik and Frankfurter quarters of the city, smashing the windows and looting the shops of their contents. The police made repeated charges and engaged in conflicts until the mob was finally dispersed.

BERLIN, Feb. 26-1 A. M.-One hundred arrests have been made. Many persons have been wounded, including several policemen. Many clothiers', jewelers', grocers' and other shops were broken into and ransacked. The mob thronged the streets, shouting "Give us something to eat." It is reported that the Emperor witnessed the Unter den Linden affair from the castle windows.

The majority of persons arrested will probably be liberated, but the leaders will be punished severely. No unusual distress prevails in Berlin, except such as results from lack of work in the building and cognate trades, which is inevitable in winter, though the distress has been intensified by the recent strikes.
