The steamer Kinau leaves Hilo on July 2d, arriving in Honolulu on the morning of July 4th. She will be placed on the Marine Railway to be cleaned.

Two Japanese murderers named Masuda and Otsuka respectively, were brought down from Maui yesterday under sentence of death. They are to be hanged on September 12th.

A native woman named Pua gave birth to a baby girl on board the steamer Mikahala while at Hanalei last Saturday noon. The mother and baby arrived in Honolulu yesterday.

The treason scare is over. If report is true, Deputy Attorney-General No. 2, Antonio Rosa, received \$500 for his services during the trial, and, therefore, he is the only man that came out a winner.

Cabinet-making is the business of the hour. It was said last night that a number of Cabinet-makers had a meeting last evening on Kaahumanu street in the vicinity of Hon. A. P. Peterson's office.

A young native named David Richards was arrested yesterday for the larceny of a watch. The boy was employed at the Woodlawn dairy, and is supposed to have taken the watch from a fellow-employee's room.

The World's Fair Commission will hold an important meeting this morning at 9 o'clock in the Chamber of Commerce room. Hon. L. A. Thurston will report the result of his investigations while at Chicago.

Mr. H. G. Wootton, who has filled the position of engineer and lately as superintending engineer, of the Naalehu and Hutchinson plantations, Hawaii, for the past three years, arrived in town on Saturday by the Kinau. Mr. Wootton will depart on the steamer Alameda this week for the Coast, for the benefit of his health.

The Executive Committee of the Fourth of July celebration held a meeting on Saturday to consider a proposition made by the Hotel management. Colonel Macfarlane stated that if the committee would decide to have the ball at the Hotel, he would agree to erect a dancing pavilion on the lawn near the new band stand. It is very likely that his proposition will be accepted.

Last night at the Central Union Church, the Rev. Mr. Okabe, Pastor of the Japanese Church at Hilo, gave a brief account of his trip to Japan and of the condition of Christianity in that country. Mr. Okabe is an able man, and his remarks were listened to with much pleasure. He returns after an absence of several months, accompanied by his assistant. The latter also made a few appropriate remarks in Japanese, Mr. Okabe translating.

WHARF AND WAVE.

DIAMOND HEAD, JUNE 26.—9 P.M. Weather, clear; wind light north.

The steamer Kinau will arrive in Honolulu July 4th on her next homeward trip and will be hauled out on the marine railway to be cleaned.

Engineer Steel, of the Kinau, who had his foot crushed in the machinery of the vessel recently, is able to be about on his feet again.

The British ship Benmore sailed on Saturday, June 26th, for San Francisco with 34,216 bags sugar, weighing 3,982,849 pounds and valued at \$102,199.99.

The bark Albert is at the O. S. S. Co.'s wharf. She will leave tomorrow for San Francisco.

The Japanese steamship Yamashiro Maru, Captain Young, left on June 26th for Yokohama. She took 2 Chinese and 398 Japanese passengers, 68 of the latter being women and 26 children.

The bark Alden Besse and brigantine Consuelo both arrived at Kahului from San Francisco last week. They are now loading sugar for San Francisco. The Alden Besse will likely get away next Wednesday.

The Claudine reported showers of rain at Hana and Kohala last week. Hamakua remains dry.

The steamer City of New York, which recently made a run from New York to Queenstown at an average speed of a little more than twenty miles an hour, is an American ship, owned by Americans, but does not sail under the American flag.


