A biennial meeting of members of the Queen's hospital will be held tomorrow at the Chamber of Commerce, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Captain Schage, of the schooner Allen A., which arrived from Berkeley, California, yesterday, is accompanied by his wife and family.

The board of trustees of the Queen's hospital will elect officers tomorrow immediately after the biennial meeting at the chamber of commerce.

Invitations for a reception and dance, to take place Saturday afternoon on board the U. S. S. Adams, will be sent through the postoffice today.

The San Francisco Examiner of a late date says that Laurie Ryan, the purser of the steamer Australia, will settle in Honolulu, where he has a fine home.

On Saturday next, at 12 o'clock, noon, Jas. F. Morgan will sell the warehouse and lease of valuable city front property. The lease has ten and a half years to run.

The Portuguese mission school on Miller street will hold its closing exercises on Friday morning at 10:30 o'clock. All friends of this school are most cordially invited to be present.

W. W. Chamberlain, lately book-keeper at Theo. H. Davies & Co.'s branch store at Honokaa, Hamakua, Hawaii, came down to Honolulu by the steamer Lehua yesterday afternoon. Willie is going by the next Australia to see the World's Fair.

A NEW RELIGION. A native named J. Kekipi, formerly a sugar planter in Kohala, Hawaii, and now a hack driver, has a notice in this morning's Ka Leo calling on the natives to meet next Sunday at the Seventh Day Adventist church, Printer's lane, for the purpose of organizing a new form of religion, to be known as "The Wise Religion" (Ka Hoo-mana Naanao). Mr. Kekipi does not believe in the other churches. He was at one time a politician, but became disgusted when he ran for the legislature against C. W. Ashford and was beaten.

Jumped on Him. Okta, a Japanese informer, who formerly lived at Papaikou, Hawaii, came to Honolulu a few weeks since to find employment. Yesterday four of his countrymen found him at a house on Mauakea street, where they all jumped upon him, kicking him about the body and face. When Okta was brought to the station house, his face was cut in several places. Three of his assailants were arrested, but were released upon furnishing bail of \$25 each.

Another Leper. Jacob Sims, the negro bootblack, who was lately arrested as a leper suspect has been examined at the receiving station at Kalihi and declared to be a leper. He will go to Molokai with the next batch.

It Still Hurts. Kaeialoha, the native policeman who was shot by Mr. John Good, on Fort street, last January, during the revolution, says that he has not thoroughly recovered the use of his right arm yet. It still pains him when he lifts anything heavy.

Another Rumor. The arrival of the steamer Lehua from Hamakua yesterday was the occasion for starting another false report to the effect that Koolau was killed and that his wife and son were on the Lehua.

Postponed. The Hawaiian Base Ball Association met yesterday, but owing to the fact that no quorum was present the business in hand was postponed until Friday of next week for which time the meeting is again called.

WITHOUT A LICENSE.

Mr. J. P. Murphy Cited to Show Cause.

Summons was issued yesterday citing Mr. J. P. Murphy, agent for the assignee of the estate of McKevett & Co., of Melbourne and Belfast, to appear before the district magistrate of Honolulu, Friday morning, to show cause why he should not be fined for selling goods without a license.

When it was learned that the goods were to be sold at public auction, the various drygoods firms of the city protested against the sale unless Mr. Murphy took out a proper license. At the conclusion of the first auction sale at the Arlington yesterday morning, the summons was issued. Mr. Morgan will continue the sale of the goods tomorrow at the same hour.

HELD ON SUSPICION. Probably the Man Who Burglarized C. B. Wilson's House.

Ah Loi, an old offender, was arrested yesterday by Police Captain Klemme, on suspicion that he was the burglar who entered C. B. Wilson's residence early last Tuesday morning, and carried away Wilson's gold watch and chain and \$56 in money. Ah Loi was seen by the mounted police prowling around Mr. Wilson's premises last Monday morning and evening, apparently with nothing to do.

The police searched all day Tuesday for him, but he had evidently hid himself and could not be found at any of the places where he has been in prison several times before and is now held at the police station pending an investigation.

A STRANGE COMET.

Discovered by Mr. Wm. Auld Last Night.

Last night about 8 o'clock Mr. Wm. Auld of the Insane Asylum announced by telephone there was a comet visible in the northwest sky. In answer to an inquiry Prof. C. J. Lyons of the government survey said he knew of no comet due, but that he would take a look and report.

An hour later Prof. Lyons reported that a strange comet was visible in the northwest sky, in the southern portion of the constellation Great Bear. At 8 P. M. the comet is about an hour high, at a declination of about forty degrees. The comet shines about as bright as a star of the third magnitude. Prof. Lyons will endeavor to identify the comet as soon as possible.

WHARF AND WAVE. DIAMOND HEAD, July 12, 10 P. M.: Weather, hazy; wind, light E. The bark Ceylon has gone over to the O. R. & L. Co.'s wharf to load sugar.

The schooner Mokuola is held down at the fish market wharf for repairs.

It was raining along the Hamakua coast when the steamer Lehua left for Honolulu. There was no foreign vessel at Hilo.

A broken roller from Wainaku, Hilo, Hawaii, was brought by the steamer Lehua yesterday to be repaired at Honolulu Iron Works.

The steamer Iwalani is expected today from Kalaup.

The tern Allen A., Captain Schage, was docked at Allen & Robinson's wharf yesterday, about 18 1/2 days from Eureka with 375,000 feet of redwood lumber for Allen & Robinson. Reported having had a good passage to Honolulu. The Allen A. is nearly the same size as the Glendale. The two vessels appear like sister ships.

Mr. Creighton Better. Mr. Chas. Creighton, who was thrown out of a carriage about a week ago, is still confined to his house from the injuries received therefrom. It is expected he will be able to be out in a few days.
