INTEREST AWAKENED.

Horsemen Want a Programme for September 2d.

The announcement of the match between Lord Brock and Duke Spencer for a purse of \$1000, has awakened interest among lovers of horse racing in this city.

This race is to take place on the 2d of September on the Jockey Club track.

For some days there has been a great deal of talk among horsemen who all agree that the Jockey Club should make an effort to arrange a programme of four races to take place on the afternoon of September 2d.

They claim that if the club will offer purses owners of horses will enter their animals.

The Jockey Club will hold a meeting this evening to consider the matter. In addition to the race between Lord Brock and Duke Spencer the following programme is suggested by a man who understands horse racing.

1. Trotting and pacing race, free for all horses not having a record better than three minutes. Purse, \$100.

2. Running race, one-half mile and repeat, for Hawaiian-bred horses only. Purse, \$100.

3. Running race, one-half mile dash, free for all. Purse, \$75.

4. Trotting and pacing race, mile heats to harness, best 3 in 5, free for all. Purse, \$125.

SATURDAY'S GAME.

The Kams. Defeat the Hawaiiis by a Score of 4 to 1.

A fairly large audience witnessed the game last Saturday between the invincible Kamehamehas and the Hawaiiis. The audience showed their appreciation of the good plays made by the players by giving loud applause.

The Kams. introduced two new faces on the diamond, Henry Wise and W. Bridges, who played as pitcher and catcher respectively.

These new comers were worthy successors of Messrs. Meheula and Baker, who filled other positions during the game. The Kams. defeated the Hawaiiis by a score of 4 to 1, the game lasting 1 h. 7 min.

The Hawaiiis made their only run in the 7th innings, while the Kams. made 2 in the 1st and 1 each in the 3d and 4th innings. Mahuka made a daisy double play in the 7th innings, putting out Pryce and Willis. The score by innings was as follows:
