A Million-Dollar Fire Sweeps Over Santa Cruz.

LILUOKALANI NOW WANTS A PENSION

Coxey's Army Still Marches On—Senator Peffer And His Little Bill—General Slocum Dead—Behring Sea Matters—The New Minister to Ecuador.

Shortly before midnight on April 15th, a fire broke out near the court house at Santa Cruz, California, totally destroying the business portion of the town. The loss is estimated at a million dollars. The residence portion of the town was not harmed. Santa Cruz has only a small fire department and there was no water in the mains, consequently the firemen could do nothing. Special trains with fire engines on board were sent from San Jose and Watsonville. Toward morning the water pipes filled and the engines could do but little work. At the latest date the fire was still raging, and there was a likelihood of it spreading to the residence portion of the city.

Is Satisfied With a Pension. LONDON, April 14.—The Chronicle says that ex-Queen Lilliuokalani has been convinced of the hopelessness of her trying to be reinstated and is willing to have the islands annexed to the United States with a view to obtain the pension which President Harrison advised. A petition to that effect is being prepared for submission to President Cleveland.

Hints of a Panic. WASHINGTON, April 14.—"What will the police do when Coxey and his army reach here?" is the question agitating the minds of Coxeyites and their sympathizers, but upon this question the police are mute. They will do their duty, so they say, but just what will be considered their duty they are not saying.

As the army of the commonwealth approaches Washington the congressional calendars begin to show signs of the money madness that has seized certain classes of people. Senator Peffer today introduced another bill of that peculiar and unique class known as "crank legislation." He distinctly disavowed its parentage and stated that it was introduced at the request of a workmen's organization of this city. It is entitled "An Act to enable the public authorities to establish systems of public cooperation," and provides literally that the Secretary of the Treasury "is authorized to prepare a sufficiency of declaratory not promissory, full, not partial legal tender money, of aluminum or silk threaded paper, as the people may prefer, and to count the same into the treasury to enable the treasurer to pay drafts on the treasurer from each public authority, such as municipalities, counties, States (including territories) and districts of this republic) annually for any amount of money not in excess of the sum of \$1000 capita, according to the next federal census; in order that said public authorities may not only pay their debts forthwith, but immediately seize, condemn, appraise and purchase, or construct as well as operate the vast amount of what is now known as private property for public uses, free of rent, interest and profit."

In the Senate today Senator Peffer offered a resolution giving Coxey's army a hearing. BOSTON, April 14.—In an interview today Grand Master Workman Sovereign said the Coxey movement was the foreboding of an insurrection. Thousands of toilers were watching it, ready to resent any abuse the army may receive from municipal, State or national officials. The army was to the workmen today what John Brown's party was to the slaves before the war.

Chauncey a Candidate. ST. LOUIS, April 14.—Hon. Chauncey M. Depew, who is here, announces himself a candidate for President of the United States.

The New Chinese Treaty. WASHINGTON, April 14.—Senator White is inclined to believe there will be little opposition to the ratification of the Chinese treaty. Some Senators even go so far as to say that there will not be more than seven or eight votes cast against it.

To Help Chris Evans. LOS ANGELES, April 14.—Officers have ferreted out the mystery of the first and second hold-up and the train robberies at Roscoe. At the time of the first robbery it was stated that the robbery at Roscoe December 23d was projected for the purpose of assisting Chris Evans, which turns out to be truth. The plan, which was successful, was to draw the Fresno officers to that point, so as to allow Evans to escape. Three men are now under arrest for the robbery.

Reached Bluefields. COLON, April 14.—The United States cruiser San Francisco, from Rio, arrived at Bluefields on Wednesday. There is no truth in the report that the Governor of Nicaragua allowed the British to take possession of Corn Island. The commander of the Magicienne reports all quiet at Bluefields. The report that Nicaragua has threatened a second seizure of the Mosquito Reservation is confirmed. Four hundred Nicaraguan soldiers are said to be contemplating landing at Bluefields. They will be resisted by the people of Bluefields.

Fierce Fire at San Diego. SAN DIEGO, April 14.—A fire started from a gasoline stove in the rear end of George A. Troxell's confectionery

store on Fifth street this evening, and destroyed a row of one-story buildings of flimsy construction before it could be brought under control. Total damage about \$6000.

A Nomination Confirmed. WASHINGTON, April 14.—The Senate has confirmed the nomination of Edward H. Strobel of New York to be Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States to Ecuador.

An Unlikely Story. FRESNO, April 14.—It became known today that the Fresno jail was guarded last night because the officials expected an attack by a mob, with a view of getting out Dick Heath, who is accused of murdering a lawyer named McWhirter. It is believed the purpose of the story is to create sympathy for the accused and to prepare the way for asking for a change of venue.

Charges Prejudice. NEW YORK, April 14.—Rev. Francis Dent of Brooklyn, who recently sued Bishop Ryan of the Catholic diocese of Buffalo for \$100,000 for defamation of character, the suit being decided against him, has made an application before the Supreme Court for a new trial of the case. The grounds include prejudice on the part of the judge and jury.

Plead the Baby Act. LONDON, April 14.—The Earl of Kimberley has prepared a number of amendments to the Behring Sea bill, which he will move in the House of Lords when the bill is considered in committee. The amendments have reference to clause 7, which is as follows:

"Where upon any proceedings against a person or ship in respect of any offense against the act it is provided that if the ship sailed from its port of departure before the schedule of provisions was published there, and that such a person or master of a ship did not after sailing and before the alleged offense receive notice of those provisions, such a person shall be acquitted and the ship shall be released and not forfeited."

General Slocum Dead. NEW YORK, April 14.—General Henry W. Slocum died this morning. He had been ill only a few days. He was born on September 24, 1827, at Delphi, Onondaga county, New York. He fought in the civil war and resigned in 1865 to resume the practice of law.

All Tied Up Now. SEATTLE, April 14.—The strike of the Great Northern now extends over the entire main line from St. Paul to Spokane. The prospects are that the entire system will be covered, except, possibly, the coast lines. The strike includes all connected with the handling of trains, including train dispatchers and telegraphers. A reduction in pay is the cause of the strike.

Removal of the Utes. WASHINGTON, April 14.—The proposition to remove the Southern Ute Indians from Colorado to Utah seems to be settled as far as the House Committee on Indian affairs is concerned. It has, by a vote of 7 to 6, decided to report adversely the bill ratifying the agreement for the Indians' removal.

Big Miners' Strike. BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 14.—A strike of coal miners was inaugurated in this district this evening. The miners at Coalbury, Brookside and Cardiff struck at 3 o'clock. About 3000 men are affected.

Mello Gives Up. MONTEVIDEO, April 14.—The Associated Press correspondent is able to announce that Admiral de Mello and 1500 insurgent troops who embarked on the frontier of Uruguay, after having been driven out of the State of Rio Grande do Sul, have surrendered, and the rebellion in Brazil may be said to have completely collapsed.

Favors Secession. LINCOLN, Neb., April 14.—A remarkable letter to Governor Waite of Colorado will be published tomorrow. The author is Robert McReynolds of Oklahoma, who formerly lived in Lincoln and is now in Denver. The document recommends the secession of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado and other States. The silver issue is made one of the leading grounds of the declaration, and McReynolds claims that when the bill is presented to Governor Waite he will have the full endorsement and bear the signatures of leading men in the States named.
