LILIUOKALANI'S RELINQUISHMENT.

Liliuokalani has at last come to her senses, though to what degree of perfection her smattering of common sense has been exercised will not be known until the full text of the letter sent President Dole yesterday is made public. The fact still remains that she was impelled to relinquish all her claims connected with the monarchy only after every possible effort to maintain her personality as the only rightful ruler of the Hawaiian Islands, including in those efforts a connection with and clearly established approval of, treasonable acts against a government the strength of which is now unquestioned, and which has been duly recognized by all the leading powers of the world.

The question which today presents itself, is whether her guilt is less subject to punishment, now that it is veneered with the thin coating of practical abdication. Had she performed this little ceremony, which she might have done very gracefully, during the two years past she certainly would have occupied a warmer spot in the hearts of those who are determined to have a stable government at whatever cost.

The color of her guilt for actions done in the past is not one whit less brilliant simply because she has been summarily brought to a standstill at each and every turn. She has been allowed all the rope possible and has seen fit to bind herself to the post that savors of criminal foundation, and except for the possible effect her last performance might have upon her followers and the native population, there is nothing to shield her from the full weight of the process of law to which she has laid herself liable. One thing is certain, the people of this country will require full and unreserved proof that she will never again, during her natural life indulge in any connection with any political dickerer that has the least tinge of royalty, before they consent to one iota of the pardon which she by her relinquishing of rights to the throne, craves.

Whatever the outcome of this last scene in the Hawaiian political drama, it is another nail which serves to clinch the success of the cause of annexation, and another nail in the coffin of the policy of the present American administration toward Hawaii-nei.

THE right to a free and untrammelled expression of opinion upon the conduct of national affairs is causing any quantity of trouble in more than one nation of the world. In Italy three papers have been summarily closed for publishing the proceedings of a society with strong anarchistic proclivities, while Chancellor Hohenlohe is seriously contemplating bringing the Socialists of the Reichstag to account for a treasonable act which consisted in those members keeping quiet when a call for cheers for the Emperor was made. In the United States, newspapers and political representatives could do identically the same thing and arouse only a passing attention. All of which goes to show that no international law can be established to control the expression of opinions regarding the powers that be. The right to freely express one's opinions is a splendid thing, but it can only be safely guaranteed in countries where the public mind is so constituted that it does not naturally frame opinions favorable to the promotion of crime and disorder. A man in New York City can give expression to

thoughts which in Roanoke, Va., would cost him a visit from the White Caps or the State officials.

SENATOR TELLER expresses sorrow for the Harrison administration in that it showed some haste in the matter of the treaty for annexing Hawaii, etc. Mr. Teller's compassion is not needed. There was no haste. The matter had been drifting toward annexation for half a century. The people in interest took the initiative, offered the islands, and the Harrison administration had to say yes or no. Mr. Teller's claim of haste is without any basis whatsoever. In saying that if Harrison had not accepted the offer the islands would now be a part of this republic Mr. Teller offers to Mr. Cleveland the most contemptuously blistering insult ever thrown at him in this regard, implying as it does that his only motive in resisting annexation was a petty spite toward Mr. Harrison.—Boston Traveller.

REV. DR. PARKHURST devoted a portion of his Sunday morning discourse recently to denouncing newspapers, whose policy he did not exactly approve, as a public nuisance. The reverend gentleman makes the mistake which others in his position are prone to fall into. He forgets that the newspapers were an all-important round in the ladder by which he has plucked the plum of fame and success in his venture. Like so many others he has received all the free advertising necessary and turns to behold in holy horror the medium that has made his name known in every household of his country.

AMERICAN journals are trying to prove a conciliation between Senator Hill and President Cleveland, from the fact that Hill attended a cabinet dinner given by the President. Should David Bennett Hill join the cuckoo ranks, as he is said to have done, he will be the first bald-headed cuckoo on record. His political history has, however, shown that it will require something more than a cabinet dinner of fine herbs to catch the wily David.
