

LAID TO REST.

Funeral of Ex-Princess Poomaikelani—Interment in Mausoleum.

The funeral of the late ex-Princess Poomaikelani, sister of the Dowager Queen Kapiolani, took place yesterday afternoon from St. Andrews Cathedral. The cathedral was crowded in every part with the friends of the deceased, principally Hawaiians.

The chief mourners were ex-Princess Kawananakoa and Kalani-anoole. In the seat behind them were Chief Justice Judd, Judge Whiting and Paul Neumann. Others present were John Ena and wife, the sisters and pupils of St. Andrews Priory, Captain Tripp, Mrs. Gulick, Sir Robert Herron, Mrs. Haalea, Mrs. Graham and Mrs. Smithies.

The service was read in Hawaiian by the Bishop of Honolulu, and the surprised choir sang two hymns, Wray Taylor presiding at the organ. The floral offerings were most beautiful. The remains were interred in the Mausoleum, Nuuanu Valley, where all the kings and queens are buried.

It is understood that the deceased lady in her will has remembered St. Andrews Priory and Iolani College. She was a member of St. Andrews Cathedral congregation.

PASSENGERS IN QUANTINE.

Number for Hawaii and Maui Begin Five Days' Term.

Now that the Kauai people have left the quarantine station, the Maui and Hawaii contingent will be given a chance to lock themselves up from the outside world for the privilege of returning to their homes. The latter are quite elated over the report made by the Kauai people that the cost of living out there amounted to only \$1.40 a day. They intend to follow the example of the Kauai people with respect to having a good time, and although there are not as many, they have made up their minds to make fully as much noise. Following is a list of the persons to go into quarantine at 11 a. m. today: C. H. Fairer, C. Kaiser, E. P. Low, wife and four children; W. Berlowitz, J. Koch, John Frank and three children, Miss Jessie Neal, M. Harlem, H. Gorman and W. Ormsted. There were more applications for admission, but owing to lack of room at the station it was impossible to accommodate any more.

THE RUMMIES GIVE UP.

The New York saloon keepers driven by the police and threatened with imprisonment by the courts, have at last decided to obey the Sunday law. They did not do so, however, until several had been given a jail sentence and others had been heavily fined, and they had come to the conclusion that the authorities were in earnest in their determination to enforce the law against law-breaking rum-sellers, the same as against other criminals. Then the executive committee of the Wine, Beer and Liquor Dealers' Association got together and formally resolved that "on and after Sunday, Sep. 1," the saloon keepers would close their places on Sunday as required by the law.

The lesson of the liquor dealers' resolutions to stop Sunday selling is, that the cant of the old party press and politicians that liquor laws cannot be enforced as easily as other laws, is false. These laws can be enforced whenever men who respect their oaths of office are elected. That the liquor dealers of New York, like the "jointists" of Kansas, Iowa and other places under prohibitory laws, do not care for small fines as a punishment for law breaking, but that they do care for a jail sentence, and that they will not run the risk of law breaking when there is danger of their going to prison for it is very evident.

All honor to Commissioner Roosevelt and Justice Goff! Neither are believers in Prohibition, but both hold it to be the duty of officials to enforce impartially the laws against all offenders—saloon keepers as well as thieves and murderers. What has been done to make liquor dealers obey the law in New York can be done in every city, county and state when honest men are elected to office.—W.C.T.U.

Horseless Vehicles.

The Chicago Times-Herald announces ten entries of automobile vehicles to contest in the road race in November next. The same journal describes the Benz automatically propelled vehicle, imported from Germany by Mr. H. Mueller, of Decatur, Ill., and used by him since last May on the highways of central Illinois. This vehicle has the appearance of a high bodied phaeton and is propelled by the explosion of gas made from crude gasoline and ignited by an electric spark. The vehicle carries four persons and recently with three persons made a run of thirteen miles over country roads in 45 minutes.

PURSER POOR IN TROUBLE.

Arrested for Violating Board of Health Regulations.

After the arrival of the Australia Port Surveyor Sanders received information that the vessel had brought down a quantity of opium. No vessel except the Likelike, of which Frank Poor was purser, went alongside the Australia during her stay at this port.

The Port Surveyor supposed from this that the opium must have gone aboard the Likelike. A permit was obtained to search the steamer. Mr. Sanders left the Oceanic dock in a quarantined boat and went to the Inter-Island wharf, at which place the Likelike was tied.

When he got aboard he saw Purser Poor going toward the railroad wharf in a scow. He asked the captain where Poor was going, and received the information that he was leaving the ship. He had sent his clothes and other effects ashore at the Inter-Island wharf.

The action of Poor in leaving the Likelike while in quarantine looked very suspicious. A warrant was sworn out against him and his house searched, but nothing in the shape of opium could be found. Poor was arrested later for violating Board of Health regulations by leaving the Likelike.

He has been succeeded as purser of the Likelike by George Washington Smith.
