

QUIETLY MARRIED.

Frank L. Hoogs and Margaret Roche
Joined in Matrimony.

Ceremony at Rev. D. P. Birnie's—No
Invited Guests—Kept From
Their Friends.

Just by way of a surprise to their
many friends, Frank L. Hoogs and Miss
Margaret Roche were married last
night instead of the 17th inst., as had
been announced by the groom.

The arrangements for the wedding
were so quietly made that up to the
hour of the ceremony not more than a
handful of people knew of it.

But as in "such cases made and pro-
vided," there was a leak, and an Ad-
vertiser reporter was at the wedding
in the spirit, and just outside Preacher
Birnie's fence in the flesh.

The wedding was arranged to take
place at 8:30 last night, and just a few
minutes before that time a carriage
containing the bridal couple drove to
the gate of the parsonage, where they
got out and went into the house with-
out ceremony. Five minutes later the
front door closed and remained so until
a quarter to nine, when Mr. and Mrs.
Hoogs as unceremoniously emerged,
in the groom in evening dress and the
petite bride in a beautiful white cos-
tume cut with half sleeves and high in
the neck. There was no display of flow-
ers or elaborate ornamentation, a little
bunch of flowers on the left shoulder of
the bride being all that was noticeable.

To one who did not know otherwise
they might have been taken for a cou-
ple on the way to a reception rather
than a spick and span married pair.

As soon as they were seated in the
carriage the driver whipped his horse
and drove direct to the lovely home of
Mr. Hoogs on King street, near Rich-
ards, which has recently been furnished
throughout by him in anticipation of
the event. Just a few friends were
waiting their arrival. An informal re-
ception followed.

Mrs. Hoogs, a petite blonde of the
Titian stamp, is a sister of Mrs. Thos.
Krouse, and a charming girl. She has a
quiet, lovable disposition and rare edu-
cational attainments. She has been a
resident of Honolulu for the past five
years, and has resided with her sister
and Mr. Krouse at the Eagle and Ar-
lington hotels.

The groom, who is a brother of Wm.
Hoogs, came here about six years ago
as manager of the California hall team,
and at the end of the season returned
to the coast with the men, remaining
there about a year, when he again
came to Honolulu and was engaged as
reporter on the Advertiser, remaining
with the paper until a year ago, when
he became business manager of the
Star. For the past three years he has
been editor and owner of the monthly
Paradise of the Pacific, making it one
of the best papers in the country for ad-
vertising the beauties of the country
and encouraging tourist travel. He is

manners, a combination which has won
