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Annexation Movement is Set in Motion.

Lahaina Church Near Completion. Business and Society Notes.

MAUI, Jan. 9.—The question of annexation is again being agitated on Maui. There will be a meeting some evening of next week in the Waituku Court House, to which citizens from all the districts of the island have been invited.

It is stated that all the old district societies will soon be revived. As far as it can be learned the sentiment on Maui in favor of union with the United States has steadily increased during the last year or two.

The beautiful Lahaina church, built from plans designed by Ripley & Dickey of Honolulu is well-nigh completion. This artistic structure is the gift of Hon. H. P. Baldwin, and is intended to replace the old adobe Wane church, in which Dr. Baldwin, father of Mr. Baldwin, preached for many years.

The kona wind of last week blew the iron roof of "Craigielea," the summit house of Haleakala. The fierce blast scattered the sheets of iron all over the mountain side; not a piece remains in position, and the rafters have been badly injured, so violent was the storm.

A farewell luau was given Thursday evening by Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Dickey of Haiku, in honor of Misses Grace and Belle Dickey, who return to Oahu College today. The spread was a fine one, consisting of all the delicious viands known to Hawaiians. The guests were the younger residents of Makawao district, who, after enjoying the 3 o'clock feast, completed a most pleasant evening with progressive "42."

Police Court Notes.

In the Police Court yesterday morning S. Paaluh was found guilty of truancy and was committed to the Reform School for one month.

Ah Ho plead guilty to the charge of having opium unlawfully in his possession and was given one month's imprisonment at hard labor.

Ah Sang and Ah Sing plead guilty to the charge of gambling, and were each fined \$10 and costs. Ching Sing plead guilty to the charge

of having opium unlawfully in possession. Fined \$50 and costs. Pin Chew, Chee Koon and Lo Choy were each fined \$25 and costs for having the fa tickets in possession.

ASWAN AGAIN.

Arrested by Lieut. Needham and Others for Possession of Opium.

Ho Sin Kee, better known as Aswan, was arrested again yesterday, with three other Chinamen, for having opium in possession. He thought he had fortified himself sufficiently to escape the efforts of the police to enter his place on Nuuanu street, but he forgot to calculate on a sharp saw and a 15-pound hammer, wielded by a strong arm.

Yesterday morning Lieutenant Needham and two other officers went to the Aswan building and took notes on the situation. An officer was sent to the roof, and by sawing away the wooden bars, placed across the window, provided an entrance from above.

At the given signal Lieutenant Needham and the other officer began operations from below. Needham took a hammer and burst open the first door, secured on the inside by two strong iron bars. The second door, with one iron bar, met the same fate, and the third fell without much resistance.

The last, which opens into the roof smoking room, used by Aswan and his band of opium smokers, was open, and the officers from above and below, walked in.

There was nothing for the Chinamen to do but surrender, as all avenues of escape had been systematically blocked.

Upon searching, the officers found six pipes and a small quantity of opium. The noise of the approach of the officers had frightened the Chinamen, and it is believed that the largest quantity of opium had been washed away in the water tank.

The case of Aswan and his associates will come up in the police court this morning, adding one more to the large list of opium cases Judge De La Vergne has had to deal with during the past month.

Calculations Spoiled.

On Nuuanu avenue, opposite the Aswan place, is a building which was raided a short time ago by the police, when several Chinamen were caught with opium in their possession. The conviction of two of the number was secured. Since that time the efforts of the Chinamen were to secure themselves against police invasion. To do this they built a wooden barricade around on the inside of the galvanized iron part of the building where the officers entered before, and made boasts about to various Chinamen that they could defy the police at any and all times. However, their calculations were all to no effect. Chief Hunt of the Fire Department went to the place on Saturday and told the Chinamen they must tear down the wooden barricade, as the building happened to be on the fireproof order.
