### VOICE OF HUGO

It Is Raised Again By an Ardent Admirer.

An Imaginary Conversation With Atheists—A Paragraph Argues for Immortality.

On February 27, 1881, the French nation held a celebration in honor of Victor Hugo, when every contemporary author wrote something on the great man dead. M. Houssaye wrote an article entitled "When Victor Hugo is a Hundred Years Old," in which he gives an imaginary conversation between Hugo and four atheists. In answer to one of their arguments against the existence of God and the truth of immortality, Hugo is made to reply in the following striking and eloquent words, a paragraph of commanding force and rare beauty of diction:

"I feel in myself the future life. I am like a forest which has been more than once cut down. The new shoots are stronger than ever. I am rising, I know, towards the sky. The sunshine is on my head. The earth gives me its generous sap, but heaven lights me with the reflection of unknown worlds. You say that the soul is nothing but the resultant of bodily powers. Why, then, is my soul more luminous when my bodily powers begin to fail? Winter is on my head and eternal spring is in my heart. Then I breathe at this hour the fragrance of the lilacs, the violets and the roses, as at twenty years. The nearer I approach the end the plainer I hear around me the immortal symphonies of the worlds which invite me. It is marvelous, yet simple. It is a fairy tale, and it is history. For half a century I have been writing my thoughts in prose, verse, history, philosophy, drama, romance, tradition, satire, ode, songs. I have tried all. But I feel that I have not said the thousandth part of what is in me. When I go down to my grave I can say, like so many others, 'I have finished my day's work,' but I cannot say 'I have finished my life.' My day's work will begin again the next morning. The tomb is not a blind alley; it is a thoroughfare. It closes in the twilight to open with the dawn. I improve every hour, because I love this world as my fatherland. My work is only beginning. My monument is hardly above its

foundation. I shall be glad to see it mounting forever. The thirst for the infinite proves infinity."

#### MONEY MAKER FROM THE START.

A St. Petersburg correspondent of the London Times shows that the great Siberian Railway, which will in four years' time connect St. Petersburg with Port Arthur, will pay from the very first. It is producing trade wherever it goes. The supply of corn has already increased to a surplus of 65,000 tons in the steppe just opened up, where, only five years ago, it was necessary to import 96,000 tons a year. The yearly transport of coal is already estimated at 260,000 tons, and it is officially estimated "that the commercial traffic of the Siberian Railway within the next five years will reach 1,532,255 tons a year, and this estimate is made irrespective of any consideration of the probable through traffic when the line is completed to the Pacific," while the time expended by this railway will be fourteen days, instead of thirty-five days by sea.

#### JAPANESE IMMIGRATION.

(Kobe Chronicle, May 3.)

The agitation for the exclusion of Japanese laborers from the British colonies and from the United States, which has been in progress for the last few months, has led the Hyogo Kencho authorities to exercise a very strict supervision over the number of Japanese laborers proceeding abroad. Laborers for Canada and the United States have been restricted to thirty and fifty a month respectively, and we now understand that the Kencho has reduced the number for Canada to twenty a month, and totally stopped emigration to Australia. With respect to the last-named place we have before us a copy of an act which has been passed by the New South Wales Legislature and which came into force last November, in which certain restrictions are placed on immigrations into the colony.


