

**FOR MORE JUDGES HE GOT TEN YEARS**

Suggestions from a Local Attorney. But Might Have Had a Life Sentence.

Incorporated in Resolutions Submitted to the Bar Association at its Recent Meeting.

The following resolutions were offered by Mr. T. McCants Stewart at the Bar Association, and on his motion referred to the Executive Committee.

Whereas the legal business of Honolulu has greatly increased within the past five years and cannot be promptly disposed of by the District Court, or Circuit Court, as now organized, therefore

RESOLVED: That the President and Secretary and a committee of five members be and are hereby authorized and empowered, at their discretion, to draft and submit a Bill to the Congress of the United States, or the Legislature of Hawaii, providing for an increase of the number of Judges in this District and Circuit, and extending the jurisdiction of the District Court in civil matters so as to secure to litigants a jury trial therein, and providing further for the following plan, or such plan as to the committee may seem best:

First. Police Court with exclusive criminal jurisdiction;

Second. District Court with exclusive civil jurisdiction;

Third. Special Term (Part I) of the Circuit Court to hear motions, and all ex parte applications of every nature and kind whatsoever, said Term to be held daily from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. except Sundays and holidays and the months of July and August;

Fourth. Special Term (Part II) of the Circuit Court to dispose of probate, and equity matters, divorce and jury waived cases, said Term to be held bi-monthly commencing on the first Monday, from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. except Sundays and holidays and the months of July and August;

Fifth. Two Trial Terms (Part I and Part II) of the Circuit Court for the trial of jury cases, said terms to be held bi-monthly commencing on the first Monday from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. except Sundays and holidays and the months of July and August;

Sixth. And said bill shall also provide that the Circuit Judges shall in the months of June and February designate the presiding Judges for said terms, and in the event of a disagreement among them, the Supreme Court shall make the designation upon the request of any Circuit Judge;

Seventh. And further that all hearings shall be upon calendars, to be prepared by the Clerk of the Court, and all matters shall be placed upon the calendars according to date, of filing, and shall be heard in their order without preference excepting testamentary matters and such matters as shall be shown to require speedy determination so as to prevent loss or injury or a defeat of justice;

Eighth. And further that there shall be a daily calendar to contain such a number of cases as the presiding Judge shall deem best, and said calendar shall be called daily at the opening of Court.

Ah Oi Was Not the Trusted Servant of Dr. Murray—Other Court Matters.

Ah Oi was yesterday sentenced by Judge Stanley to imprisonment at hard labor for burglarizing the premises of Dr. Murray, having been found guilty by a jury the day before. Ah Oi was not the Chinese servant of Dr. Murray nor was he a trusted employe of the doctor's. On the contrary the genial doctor never saw him until after his arrest and the testimony at the trial showed that the man had never been at the doctor's house but once before the burglary. Ah Oi was a trusted friend of one of the doctor's servants, that was all, and being such gained the information which led him to commit the burglary. Again, the sentence received by Ah Oi, instead of being an extraordinary one and the extreme limit of the law, was a very light one, the extreme limit of the law in such cases being imprisonment at hard labor for life. And again, there were not two jurymen who wanted a modification of the punishment because at the time of the rendition of the verdict none of the jurymen could possibly know what the sentence of Judge Stanley would be. Two jurymen dissented from the verdict, it is true, but their reasons for so doing have never been made public.

In the case of the Republic of Hawaii vs. Foo Shong Hu, unlawful possession of opium, a verdict of not guilty was returned by the jury after an absence of about five minutes, two dissenting.

In Judge Stanley's court yesterday the jury in the case of the Republic of Hawaii vs. Sylvano Nobrega accused of diluting milk, brought in a verdict of guilty as charged, one dissenting.

In the assumpsit case of Ng Chung Tug vs. Jick Kee the parties have signed a stipulation that the cause may be heard in vacation as of term upon three days notice by either party.

The often tried case of Frank F. Porter vs. The Hawaiian Pork Packing Company has been discontinued, a settlement having been effected out of court.
