SEA AND SHORE

The Cleveland's Boat At Hana.

The Alice Kimball Makes a Record. The Death of Lilowai. Harbor Notes.

The Lehua arrived yesterday from Maui and Molokai. She brought news of the safe arrival at Hana of the ship's boat from the disabled Cleveland. The boat, containing one of the mates and two seamen, arrived at Hana on last Wednesday. The men were very much fatigued after their long journey. They reported the facts of the steamer's mishap as already published, excepting that they said the Cleveland was 320 miles northeast instead of northwest of Maui. The Claudine, which was still at Maui, was at once sent out to search for her by Mr. Baldwin. If the Island steamer falls in with the Cleveland she will bring her here for repairs. It is thought the boats will probably reach here in a day or two, as the winds lately prevailing would tend to bring the disabled vessel along at quite a brisk rate, so that she would be much nearer the islands by the time the Claudine reached her than when the small boat left her. The news of the small boat's arrival was telephoned to Lahaina just as the Lehua was leaving, so that a detailed account of the time of the accident was not secured.

Big Boats.

Two new Pacific Mail steamers now being built at Newport News will compete directly with the Great Northern vessels in the Asiatic trade. One will be completed in December, 1900, and the other early next year. They are the largest steam vessels ever contracted for in the United States up to date. They will cost \$2,500,000 each. The length is 575 feet, beam 63 feet, depth 40 feet, tonnage 18,100 tons, speed 18 knots (which is faster than the Great Northern steamers), and there will be accommodations for 150 cabins and 1200 stowage passengers. The actual cargo capacity will be about 12,000 tons.

The Spreckels Sugar Company of San Francisco has contracted with the Cramps of Philadelphia to build two steamships very nearly as large, of 10,500 tons and a speed of eighteen knots, which they will use on the Oceanic line between San Francisco, Honolulu and Australia.

NOTES.

The Lehua brought 1,904 sacks of sugar from Maui.

The quarantine at Lahaina has been raised, excepting to Honolulu.

The Kaui, arriving yesterday from Kauai, brought 6,387 bags of sugar.

The Cyrus Wakefield is loading sugar at the railroad wharf for New York.

Yesterday while being moved from the stream to the Oceanic wharf to discharge, the E. B. Sutton got stuck on a mudbank just off the dock.

The old cannons so long doing duty as hitching posts outside the Oceanic dock were transplanted yesterday and will hereafter be put in use to hold the lines of the ships at the new jog wharf.

The Star of Bengal made a record for discharging coal. She went alongside Pacific Mail wharf last Tuesday afternoon, and up to last night had discharged 2,600 tons. She goes into the stream today.

Lilowai, one of the crew of the Alice Kimball, died on her last trip at Kaunakakai, where he drank too much liquor. He had been in the employ of the Wilder Steamship Co. for a long time and leaves a wife and several children.

The schooner Alice Kimball has made a sailing record never beaten by any of the Island steamers from Kihai to Kaunakakai. She traveled the distance in the remarkable time of four hours and thirty-five minutes. The distance covered was over forty miles.

RAILROAD TUNNEL COMPLETED. Plantation Company Now Running Cane Trains Through It.

The railroad tunnel of the Honolulu Plantation Company has been completed, track laid through it and connected with the ramifications of the railroad on each side of the mountain. The tunnel is 200 feet long, heavily timbered and measures nine perpendicular feet on the sides. An arched roof gives sixteen feet clear space from the center of the track, amply sufficient for any loads of cane which may be carried. J. H. Howatt, the superintendent of the work, has been working steadily for three months with a large force of Japanese and no losses of life were recorded, although every foot of the entire distance had to be blasted. The plantation will next devote the energies of the engineering force to tunnelling the mountains for a water supply. Work will be commenced at an early date. Hopes are entertained that a large supply will be obtained by this means.

NEW CHINESE PAPER.

Reform is the Watchword of the Latest Publication.

Leung Chi-tso, the Chinese reformer, with a price of \$65,000 on his "unquelled" head, has an organ. It appeared yesterday and is called the Sun Chung Kwok Bo. It is a neatly lithographed, 4-page weekly, printed in Chinese characters, and full of patriotic sentiments in regard to the Celestial fatherland across the sea. Its principal article is an open letter to Li Hung Chang, written by Leung Chi-tso, who besides dictating the fashion in Mongolian haircutting, seeks to direct his countrymen in the path of reform.

From the tone of Leung Chi-tso's writing it is evident he esteems the wise Li as his friend and the friend of reform. Some thirteen months ago, when Leung fled from Peking to save his head, Li sent him a message of hope, and about the same time offered a reward of 100,000 taels for his life. Leung Chi-tso does not mention the tael business in his letter, but refers gratefully to the message. A great crowd of Chinese swarmed the editorial rooms at Nuuanu and King streets yesterday morning to get the first copies of the Sun Chung Kwok Bo as they came from the press.

The Pathfinder.

Capt. Perkins of the Pathfinder has received orders detaching him from that ship and ordering him to Manila on duty connected with the coast survey. Capt. Dow, late Lieutenant, U. S. N., who has been executive officer of the Pathfinder since she was launched, will assume command. The Pathfinder will proceed to Seattle to fit out for her coming season's work in Alaska as soon as she has completed the survey of the harbor of Kaunakakai, in which she is at present engaged, and will probably return next autumn to continue her work among the Islands.
