



SEA AND SHORE

Seven Island Steamers Get Away.

Busy Day on Water-front--United States Islands' Trade--Navigation Congress.

Yesterday was Island-steamer day with a vengeance. No less than seven boats departed for the other islands.

Shippers were kept hustling on the waterfront and the streets and wharves were jammed with drays and carts carrying all kinds of merchandise to the vessels and hacks and carriages taking passengers to the different docks from which the various steamers left. The lei women were on hand as usual and did a thriving business.

The Mauna Loa left at about 10 o'clock in the morning on her regular route for Lahaina, Maiala, Kona and Kau, carrying many passengers and a large cargo. The Kinau left shortly after noon with many persons for Hilo and other Hawaii ports.

At 5 o'clock the Claudine and Lehua got away for Maui and Molokai respectively. About fifty lepers went to the settlement on Molokai on the Lehua the account of which appears in another column.

Steamers Ke Au Hou, W. G. Hall and Waialeale also left port for the other Islands.

U. S. Islands' Trade.

Commerce of the United States with Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Hawaiian Philippine and Samoan Islands continues to show a rapid gain. The December figures of the Treasury Bureau of Statistics show for the single month of December exports of considerably more than two million dollars to Cuba, and imports valued at \$1,355,000 from Cuba; to Porto Rico, exports valued at \$312,000, against \$183,000 in December, 1898; to the Hawaiian Islands, exports exceeding one million dollars in value, against \$936,000 in December, 1898, and to the Philippine Islands, \$379,000, against \$10,000 in December, 1898. Taking the entire year and the five islands or groups of islands, Cuba, Puerto Rico, and the Hawaiian, Philippine and Samoan Islands, the total for 1899 shows an increase of more than 100 per cent in exports to those islands over the year 1898, while the imports from them show an increase of nearly 50 per cent over those of 1898. Naturally the commerce of Cuba would show very material gains compared with that of 1898 or 1897 when war prevailed in that island, but an examination of the earlier figures of our commerce with that island shows that the exports from the United States to it in 1899 were larger than those of any earlier calendar year, and very much greater than those of any save the reciprocity years 1892 and 1893. The same is true of Porto Rico, while the exports from the United States to the Hawaiian Islands are more than twice as great as in any year prior to 1898, and the imports from them fifty per cent in excess of those of any preceding year. In the case of the Philippines, the increase is much larger so far as relates to exports which reached in 1899 \$1,663,000, as against an annual average of about \$100,000 during the preceding decade.

A pretty clear idea of the class of merchandise being sent to the islands in question is given by a detailed table printed by the Treasury Bureau of Statistics showing the exports by principal articles to each of the islands during the month of December. Of the \$2,000,000 worth of goods sent to Cuba in December, \$122,322 was wood and manufactures thereof, chiefly lumber and furniture; \$410,000 was provisions, chiefly lard, bacon, hams, fresh beef, and condensed milk; \$336,000 was manufactures of iron and steel, including rails for railways, locomotive engines, pipes and fittings for steam works, electrical machinery, builders' hardware, and wire for fencing; \$253,737 breadstuffs, chiefly corn and oats, and \$169,000 live animals, including cattle, mules, hogs, and horses in the order named. To the Philippines, the most important items of exports in December were chemicals, \$13,568; coal, \$12,649; electrical machinery, \$84,908; boilers for steam engines, \$19,630; total manufactures of iron and steel, \$185,277, and wood and manufactures thereof, \$16,766, of which \$12,000 was lumber.

The following tables show the total value of the exports to and imports from Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Hawaiian, Philippine, and Samoan Islands, in their commerce with the United States during the calendar years 1897, 1898, and 1899:

The International Congress of Navigation will open July 28, and will last seven days. The Congress is divided into four sections, as follows:


- 1st Section--Interior Navigation.
- 2nd Section--International Navigation Management.
- 3rd Section--Maritime Navigation.
- 4th Section--Maritime Navigation Management.

Only the members of the Congress have the right to attend the meetings and take part in the excursions, to present papers and to take part in the discussions. Each member, at the time of his registration, should make known the section or sections in which he desires to take part.

The sectional deliberations will open by a resume of the preparatory reports. The deliberations in both sectional and general meetings will be held in three languages, French, English and Ger-

man. Speakers cannot occupy the tribune more than fifteen minutes. The membership fee is 25 francs, and should be sent as early as possible to the "Secretariat General du Huitieme Congres International de Navigation," Place de la Bourse, Paris.
