



On account of the races, steamers of the Wilder line will arrive from the other Islands this morning. A great many people are expected from Maui and Hawaii.

The Mauna Loa arrived in port yesterday morning with a little crowd of persons desiring to spend Kamehameha Day in Honolulu. Those employees of the steamship companies who happen to be in port on Monday, will be given a holiday so that they may have the opportunity of spending at least one of the racing days ashore. Most of the steamers of the Island fleets will manage to be in port on the 11th.

Saw a Ghost.

The beckoning of a supposed ghost deep down in the shaft alley of the transport Egbert, in San Francisco recently, caused a boy to faint and four lusty men to scramble for their lives at the hour of midnight. The fact that half a hundred men have died on the ship since she entered the service of the Government may have caused the men and boy to be on the lookout for ghosts; at any rate they lost no time in getting out of the way of the apparition when it did appear. The transport officials have been hurrying work on the Egbert, and a night shift, consisting of four men and a boy, from the Fulton Iron Works, was put at work riveting in the shaft alley. During the momentary absence of the men from the long, dark tunnel, the boy was heard to scream, and a moment later he appeared before the men, white and scared. "I've seen a ghost!" exclaimed the boy, as he fell fainting. With no regard for the boy's welfare, apparently, the four men clattered about the echoing decks, bounded over the Lawton lying alongside, ran down the gangplank to the dock, and disappeared out of the big gate like jackrabbits before a pack of wolves. The boy was sure, that he had seen the spirit of a departed soldier, and the four men, who returned at daylight, were equally positive that they, too, had seen the ghost.

Ship With Triple Hull.

The Naval Academy practice cruiser Chesapeake, (says a Washington special in the New York Tribune), is the first ship in the service to have her immersed steel hull covered with wood, and that in turn protected with copper, to secure the great advantage of a clean bottom, which made the early vessels famous for speed by their ability to make long voyages without frequent recourse to dry-docks, and at the same time retain the stanchness provided by the modern steel construction. The essential difference between the bottom of the Chesapeake and the underwater bodies of the composite gunboats of the Annapolis-Mariette class, built four years ago, lies in the fact that the gunboats had no inner "skin" of steel plates, the wooden planking in them being attached directly to the frames, while the Chesapeake was practically a triple hull. The composite construction had the disadvantage of extreme flexibility with unequal adaptation to changes of temperature, making the gunboats prone to leak. The chief difficulty encountered in the Chesapeake was due to the shortcomings of her builders, who have been notably unfortunate with all their naval contracts. After applying the wooden protection to the Chesapeake's steel hull and launching her, the builders, having no docking facilities to en-

able them to fasten on the copper protection, were compelled to send the ship to the Boston Navy Yard for completion. Here it was discovered that the planking had not been closely applied or nicely fitted, and that it allowed water to leak in between the two "skins," thereby endangering the life of the vessel through electrolytic action. Chief Constructor Hickborn, whose earnest advocacy of sheathing led to the adoption of the system in this country as well as to its popularity abroad, readily devised a method of remedying this defect by injecting a filling composition into the spaces, and the vessel has now been completed at Boston and sent to Annapolis for the use of the cadets at the Academy.

Naval Experiment.

LONDON, May 28.—Replying in the House of Commons today to a question on the subject of Saturday's naval experiment, when the British first-class battle-ship Majestic fired upon and sank the old-fashioned coast defense ironclad Belle Isle, near Portsmouth, in nine minutes, the First Lord of the Admiralty, George J. Goschen, said that to the extreme surprise of the naval men the Belle Isle did not take fire, although she was reported to have been in flames six minutes after the firing commenced.

He explained that the spectators, being at a distance from the war ship, were misled by volleys of steam and lyddite smoke. Goschen added that there was a slight smoldering in one cabin of the Belle Isle, but that otherwise the woodwork, although shattered in every direction, was not consumed by fire to any degree. The experiment was instituted specially to see whether the woodwork of the Belle Isle would burn as the woodwork of the Spanish ships destroyed by the American ships had burned.

NEW YORK, May 28.—A cable to the Sun from London says: Following recent experiments with the old war ship Belle Isle some of the newspapers are starting a campaign to procure the removal from the navy of war ships they declare obsolete. One paper pillories sixteen battle-ships which, it declares, are death traps. The Navy League lists twenty-eight battleships and forty-nine cruisers containing great quantities of combustible fittings. Some critics declare they are unable to believe the statement made in the House of Commons by Goschen yesterday that the Belle Isle did not take fire.


