## LAST MEETING TO BE TODAY

Cabinet's Final Session at Two O'clock.

## OFFICIALS MAY BE NAMED

Executive Council Yesterday Transacted Considerable Business of a Routine Nature.

For the last time the Executive Council will meet today at 2 p. m. President Dole will probably announce most of the Territorial appointments, after its conclusion. Yesterday he awaited the arrival of important dispatches which probably came on the Gaelic last night. The Cabinet yesterday transacted considerable routine business.

Those present were President Dole and Ministers Mott-Smith, Young and Cooper. Upon the motion of Mr. Cooper the amended charter of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company was granted. The Minister of Foreign Affairs stated that he had sent notices to all Hawaiian consuls abroad that the act providing for a government for the Territory of Hawaii had passed the Congress of the United States and was signed by President McKinley on April 30th, to take effect forty-five days after approval; and that the office of Foreign Affairs and the function of said consuls were terminated by said act at midnight on the 14th of June. They were instructed to complete their records up to that time and send them as soon as practicable, together with other property belonging to the Hawaiian Government, to the Secretary of the Territory.

The matter of the application of the Wahiawa Sugar Co. for an amendment to its charter increasing its capital stock to \$3,000,000 was brought up, but as the charter as amended had not been presented, no action was taken.

The application of Seeley I. Shaw for a liquor dealer's license at Hilo was referred to Sheriff Andrews for report. Upon the recommendation of the Attorney-General it was voted that the amendment to the charter of the Hilo Sugar Co. be granted as requested.

The North Kona and South Kohala Telephone Co., having written that the line is now complete and asking that the appropriation be made available, it was voted that a letter be sent informing the company that when properly certified vouchers are presented the money will be ready for them.

A motion was made and carried that the Cabinet advise the President to grant pardons to Joseph Carter and John H. Haake.

The matter of the communication, dated June 11th, from Capt. J. F. Merry of the U. S. Navy in regard to damage done the U. S. Navy wharf by the U. S. Army transport Sherman while being brought in by the pilot was by vote referred to the Minister of Finance for investigation.

In the matter of the communication from Sheriff L. A. Andrews in regard to an explosion of giant powder at Hilo on account of not being properly stored, it was voted that the Minister of the Interior promulgate all necessary and suitable regulations for the storage of nitro-glycerine and other explosives.

A motion was carried that notwithstanding the objection made by property holders, the garbage crematory be placed on South street.

In the matter of the communication dated June 8th, from the Secretary of the B. P. Bishop Estate, asking that the Government immediately remove from its property at Kakaako certain buildings erected by the Board of Health on account of bubonic plague, it was voted that a request be made to the Board of Health that all its buildings now located on the property of the Bishop estate at Kakaako be removed as soon as practicable.

## TO SELL THE FIRST MESSAGE: Will Fisher to Auction It Off On Saturday Afternoon.

There will be an interesting ceremony in the grounds of the Executive building on Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. At that time will take place the auctioning off for sweet charity's sake of the privilege of sending the first message to leave this Island by wireless telegraphy. Will Fisher, the auctioneer, has already paid \$50 into the charity fund for the privilege of selling the message, and he proposes to get all the fun there is out of the sale of the message.

Cecil Brown, C. M. Cooke and Col. J. H. Fisher have been chosen as the committee to distribute the cash obtained from the sale, and quite a goodly sum will probably be realized from it. Just before the sale takes place several experiments will be made with the wireless telegraphy instruments, which are to be located upon the tower of the Executive building, and their results will be awaited with much interest.
