

Every ship in the harbor from the meanest looking little Island schooner to the finest appearing, great, big windjammer, was decked out gloriously with flags of all the colors of the rainbow yesterday, in honor of Admission Day, in honor of the first day of Hawaii as a Territory of the United States.

Each vessel seemed to compete with the other in the magnificence of its display of bunting. The Stars and Stripes were flying everywhere side by side with the Hawaiian colors, in many instances, and in the company of flags of many foreign nations. Every ship had its house-flag floating on the breeze and it was a gay and pretty scene altogether all over the harbor.

Things were quiet on the water-front all day. The sun beat down upon the surface of the water and on the decks of the vessels lying at anchor making it pretty warm for those whose business compelled them to remain on board or to move about the harbor in small boats. The dust had its own way along shore, no watering carts were out in that part of town, and for the most part, the shipping neighborhood was nearly deserted. People were taking a holiday generally and almost everybody was viewing events uptown.

### An Unusual Occurrence.

It is seldom that there is a scarcity of British ships along the water front in San Francisco. Recently, however, there were only two along the entire front, the Musselcrag and the Marechal Suchet, both lying at Union street. There were a number of English ships in the stream and up the river.

### In No Hurry to Leave.

The French cruiser Protet was to have sailed June 4 for Seattle after a sojourn of several weeks in San Francisco, but remained longer. Commodore Germinet states that he finds San Francisco a very congenial port, and that he has been very hospitably entertained, not only by his own countrymen but by Americans. He hopes to visit that city again upon the expiration of his commission, two years hence. The Protet is not expected to leave the Pacific for at least three years, and will pass most of the time in the South seas. She will probably visit Honolulu.

### Great Fleet in Alaska.

One hundred and twenty-six vessels have sailed from San Francisco for Alaska since the beginning of the season in March. Of these, thirty-nine have Nome as their destination, the first to sail being the brig Pitcairn, on March 12th. She was the only vessel leaving for Nome in March. There were thirteen sailings for Nome in April, three being steamers, the Thrasher, Jeanie and Dora. Twenty-three left in May, including ten steamers, and thus far this month two vessels have sailed for Nome, the steamers Humboldt and San Jose. Eighty-seven other vessels have sailed since early in March for other Alaskan points, most of them being destined for the canneries, codfishing banks or whaling grounds. None of the Nome steamers is expected back before a month.

NEW YORK, June 3.—A Sun special from Washington says: Exports from the United States to Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Hawaiian, Philippine and Samoan islands will reach \$45,000,000 in the fiscal year which ends with the present month, and will be more than three times as much as in 1896 and more than twice as much as in any year of our commerce with those islands except in the years 1892, 1893 and 1894 when reciprocity greatly increased our exports to Cuba and Porto Rico.

To Cuba the total for the fiscal year seems likely to be fully \$25,000,000, against \$7,530,000 in the fiscal year 1896, and \$24,157,000 in the great reciprocity year 1893, when exports to that island were more than double those of five years earlier.

To Porto Rico the exports of the year will be in round terms \$2,600,000, against an average of \$2,750,000 in reciprocity years 1892, 1893 and 1894, when exports to that island were double those of earlier years.

To the Hawaiian islands the total for the year will be about \$15,000,000, or five times as much as in 1893, and nearly four times as much as in 1896.

To the Philippines the total for 1900 will be about \$2,500,000, or more than in the entire fifteen years since 1885. To the Samoan islands the exports of the year will be about \$125,000, or nearly as much as in all the years since 1896.

The imports into the United States from Cuba for the full year will show a total of \$31,000,000, against \$15,000,000 in 1888 and \$18,000,000 in 1897, though they still are less than the average for the reciprocity years.

From the Hawaiian islands the imports for the full fiscal year will be \$21,000,000, or double the average annual importation for the period prior to 1896, and \$20,000,000 higher than in any preceding year, while from the Philippines, war conditions which reduce producing and exporting power, the imports will be larger than in any year since 1894.

### Queen an O'Connor.

The Queen is of the old Irish royal strain. She is not only a Guelph and a Stuart, she is one of the royal O'Connors. The last Irish sovereign of the whole island was Roderick O'Connor. His sons were slain. His daughter married Hugo de Lacy. Their daughter married a De Burgh, Earl of Ulster; from them descended Ellen, wife of Robert Bruce, King of Scotland. The granddaughter of Robert Bruce, the Princess Margery, married the Lord High Steward of Scotland, and through her the Stuarts claimed the Scottish crown. From thence it is easy to trace how the royal blood of Ireland, Scotland and England meets in the person of the reigning Queen Victoria.—Irish Tourist.


