BIG TIME OR "BUST"

Hilo Getting Ready For the Fourth.

MANY HONOLULANS THERE

Rainy City is Going to Have Prize Fights, Horse Races and Lots of "Tommin's."

(Special Correspondence.)

HILO, June 27.—Prospects for the celebration of the Fourth of July grow brighter as the day approaches. Every thing is about ready for a mammoth carnival of sports and a festival of pleasures which will completely eclipse anything of the kind ever attempted on the island of Hawaii before.

The advance guard of the Honolulu delegation arrived on the Kinau, after a passage remarkable for its roughness and the all-around good time enjoyed by the Honolulu contingent.

The horses which were shipped—Silas Skinner and the shapely Directress—were landed safe and sound and are now stabled out at the track.

Rumors of a big crowd coming from the capital next week have resulted in preparations being made to provide adequate accommodation for them. Today it is well-nigh impossible to secure a room in town. The "Rainbow" Hotel is full and the Hilo Hotel and Lycurgus' are filling up rapidly.

The program for the Fourth commences at 8 a. m. with swimming races at Waialua and patriotic exercises at the race track. At 9:15 a. m. an athletic program will be carried out, to be followed by the horse-racing. A baseball game will also be numbered on the program. In the evening a grand ball will be given in the race track theater. The program of Thursday, July 5th, will consist of nine racing events.

The race track, which is named Hoolulu Park, is a mile and a half from town and a five-cent bus runs thither every ten minutes.

The track is a half-mile one, composed of layers of lava rock, sand and red clay. At present it is in bad shape and very boggy, owing to heavy rains. Until today it has been almost impossible to exercise horses on it, and as there is no place to jog the stock, both runners and harness-horses are somewhat backward in condition.

A half-mile walking race for a gold medal has been arranged between H. M. Julett and "Bob" Burns, to occur on the morning of the Fourth.

Fights are scheduled during race week between "Dink" Davis and "Bob" Burns, Billy Watts and Jimmy Pollock, and Aleck Hanson and an unknown. Burns and Hanson are training hard, the latter having well-appointed quarters at Lycurgus'.

The jumping race will be over six flights of hurdles. There are plenty of jockeys here.

All Quiet on Maui. Yesterday High Sheriff Brown, Chester Doyle, Captain Fox and several officers returned to Honolulu from that island on the Mauna Loa. No violence was offered by the Japanese. Trouble is at an end with the exception of a small strike which occurred on Thursday at Paia.

Eight Japanese were tried at Waialua, accused of having to do with recent attacks on police officers. Judge Robertson fined two of them \$25, sentenced one to six months' hard labor and discharged five.

Mayhem Alleged. Frank Pacheco appeared at the Police station yesterday accusing William L. Peterson of mayhem. The pair had had some slight misunderstanding and Peterson, it is alleged, chewed Pacheco's finger. The affair was settled out of court.

Japanese Drowned. The Kinau reports several Japanese drowned by the upsetting of a boat taking passengers ashore at Lahaina from the steam launch Talulu on Thursday. The sea was rough at the time.
