street on King and when opposite the
board fence surrounding the construction
work on the E. O. Hall building he
found there was too little space for
his to pass a wagon coming toward
Fort street.

Woman is Found.

Last night the police located Keali,
the native woman who was thought
to have been foully dealt with by her
husband. She has been kept in hiding
since the case came to trial. Deputy
Sheriff Chillingworth went to the wom-
an's house and brought her to the
station house where she will be detain-
ed while the trial is in progress. She
says that her husband has used all
manner of threats toward her during
the past few days and had intimidated
her to such an extent that she feared
to come to court to testify against him
for fear he would kill her.

LATEST COAST SHIPPING NEWS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—The new
steamer Californian was out on her en-
gineers' trial trip to-day and every-
thing was reported to be working as
satisfactorily as could be expected.
The machinery will be overhauled dur-
ing the next few days and in a short
time she will be ready for her official
trial. A rumor is current to the effect
that the big steamer may be chartered
by the Government to carry stores to
China instead of going to Honolulu.

The American ship Erskine M. Phelps
was the first vessel to enter at Hon-
olulu under the American laws. She ar-
rived there on the 14th from Manila and
the docks were crowded with cheering
people as she came up the harbor with
Old Glory flying from her peak.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—There is
every prospect that the transport Grant
will get away Sunday, and that her
destination, beyond Nagasaki, will be
Takou or Chefoo, China. Orders were
received yesterday to begin load-
ing the heavy baggage of the Sixth
Cavalry at 6 o'clock to-morrow morn-
ing. The troops will go on board later
in the day or early Sunday morning.
Then, provided Brigadier-General Adna
R. Chaffee has arrived from the East,
the Grant will steam out of the Golden
Gate on what promises to be the his-
torical initial trip of another war.

General Shafter received orders
Wednesday to equip immediately the
Sixth for field service.
SUN FRANCISCO, June 29.—The
horse transports Conemaugh and Lee-
lanaw will commence taking on the
horses of the Sixth Cavalry to-morrow
and are expected to sail for Nagasaki
some time on Saturday. The Grant,
carrying about 800 men of the Sixth
cavalry, will sail at noon on Sunday.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—The Nip-
pon Maru arrived from China and Japan
by way of Honolulu this morning and
was quarantined. Her cabin passengers
were landed about noon. Contrary to
the law, the steamer brought two passen-
gers from Honolulu—Mr. and Mrs. J. P.
Roberts. The Nippon Maru is the first
foreign steamer sailing from Honolulu
since Hawaii came under the American laws
and she is the first vessel to violate the
laws. Deputy Surveyor of the Port St.
John took official cognizance of the mat-
ter and reported it to the Collector of the
Port. The United States shipping laws
prohibit vessels of foreign registry carry-
ing passengers or freight between domes-
tic ports. Mr. Roberts and his wife origi-
nally came from the Orient on one of
the Toyo Kisen Kaisha steamers and
landed over at Honolulu. A heavy penalty
is imposed for an infraction of coast na-
vigation laws and both ship and captain
are liable to fine.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—The steamer
Moana arrived today from Australia
by way of Honolulu and was sent to
quarantine in consequence of Sydney be-
ing an infected port. About 1 o'clock the
cabin passengers from Auckland were
landed, but the Sydney passengers did
not get ashore until nearly 9 o'clock this
evening, much to their disgust. The Mo-
ana will probably be released from quar-
antine tomorrow.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—Some anx-
iety is felt by the owners of the schoo-
er Antelope, which sailed from here for
Nome in the latter part of April. Vessels
arriving from the gold diggings thus far
have failed to report the vessel. A small
morsel of comfort was picked up today
when Captain Dowdell of the Zealandia
reported having passed the vessel on
May 20th in latitude 35 degrees north, lon-
gitude 153.24 degrees west.

SHIPPING NOTES.

Steamship Doric was sighted off Ko-
ko Head at 5:20 p. m. yesterday. She
sailed from San Francisco on Saturday,
July 30th, at 2 p. m.; experienced fine
weather throughout the trip down,
making the passage in six days and six
hours.

cargo of general merchandise.

Schooner Ottilie Ford, Captain
Beach, 23 days from Kahului, arrived at
San Francisco on June 29.

H. P. Baldwin has Ticket for China
But Stays Here.

Hawaii is possessed of attractions
which are utterly irresistible. There is

H. P. Baldwin of the firm of Alex-
ander & Baldwin, who has been on the
Mainland on a business trip and a vaca-
tion, arrived from San Francisco yester-
day on the Doric. He had a ticket
through to China, but when he once
more set eyes on these entrancing tropic
isles he could not overcome their
mystic influence and overcome with
emotion for Hawaii, Mr. Baldwin
has made up his mind to forfeit his
passage to the Orient and cling to the
Sandwich Islands.

As the Doric was entering the harbor
yesterday evening, Mr. Baldwin was
gaily skipping up the saloon staircase
when some of his traveling companions
called out to him: "Now don't forget
Mr. Baldwin you are to go through to
China with us, we will have to watch
you closely and not let you get away
here." Mr. Baldwin smiled knowingly
but said nothing. He will go to Maui
on Tuesday.
