ACTS UP TO HIS NAME

Small Conduct of Judge Little.

TREATMENT OF C. A. DOYLE

Official Interpreter's Statement of Reasons For Jurist's Insult.

Chester A. Doyle, the official Japanese interpreter of the Judiciary Department, returned from Hilo Saturday and at once reported to the Attorney-General's department of the treatment he had received in Hilo at the hands of Judge Little of the Hawaii Circuit Court. Instead of allowing Mr. Doyle to proceed with himself and members of the bar to Honolulu to interpret in two Japanese murder cases, he was refused point blank a chance to perform his duties. Notwithstanding Mr. Doyle carried the order to interpret at Honolulu, written by Chief Justice Frear, the Hilo Circuit Judge said the Chief Justice was not running his court and that he had no confidence in Mr. Doyle as an interpreter. As Mr. Doyle has just been advanced for the position of interpreter for the Federal court, the petition being signed by practically every member of the Bar Association, Mr. Doyle says that Judge Little's reasons for preventing him from acting as interpreter come from personal malice, caused by an affair which took place in Hilo a few years ago between Doyle and the Judge.

When asked Saturday by an Advertiser reporter in regard to the matter, Mr. Doyle stated:

"I received instructions to proceed to Honolulu to attend Court there, there being two important Japanese murder cases ready for trial. When I arrived in Hilo I was told by Sheriff Andrews there was no necessity of my going over to Honolulu on account of Judge Little having informed him that I would not be allowed in the court, irrespective of the fact that I had been sent by the head of the Judiciary Department. I asked the Sheriff if he would make an appointment so that we three could meet. He did. We went to the Judge's office. The Sheriff opened the conversation saying he had informed me of the Judge's ultimatum. I told the Judge I had been sent by the Chief Justice. He said the Chief Justice was not running his court, and he had no confidence in me whatever, and did not intend that I should interpret. Under the circumstances there was nothing more for me to do than to return to Honolulu and the interpreting will be done by the Japanese police officer if agreeable to the lawyers of the prosecution. Otherwise the cases will have to stand over until next term."

"Of course, the reason why Judge Little refused to allow me to appear in court, is a purely personal one. Some two years ago while at Honolulu, the Judge delivered an eulogy on the death of Judge Austin who had been Judge of the Third and Fourth Circuit courts, and this address the Judge had inscribed on the minutes of the court. It was no doubt a very fine eulogy, but it lacked the chief element of originality, having been written by the late Robert Ingersoll. At that time the Judge was asking the endorsement of the Kohala people for the position of Justice of the Supreme Bench. I discovered the fact that his eulogy had been stolen from the words of Robert Ingersoll."

"The Judge was wrothy over the exposure and he invited me to his room. He asked me if I had been talking about him. I said that I had and that I had said nothing good about him. Then he struck me over the head with a loaded cane and did me up generally. We had a fight which lasted about fifteen minutes and there was very little left of the furniture or of myself when we got through. That scrap is the cause of the animus displayed on my recent official trip. The Judge is the only practicing attorney I have ever had trouble with during the ten years I have been acting as interpreter for the Judiciary Department."

MAY BUILD IN CHINATOWN.

Restrictions Removed by Board of Health.

Following the precedent established in the case of the Pantheon building, the Board of Health has decided to permit buildings to be erected on any lands where plague formerly existed, after five months have expired since the date of the burning of the buildings which formerly occupied the sites. This action was taken on Saturday upon the report of the committee appointed by President Wood to investigate the matter and report to the Board. The committee reported the following resolution, upon which the action was taken:

"Resolved, That all quarantine restrictions upon property condemned by the Board of Health on account of the existence of bubonic plague, be removed after the expiration of five months from the date of the destruction by fire of the buildings upon such property."

A Chinese Suicide.

On the last trip of the steamer Claudine to Maui an aged Chinese evidently penniless, homeless and comfortless, committed suicide by jumping overboard in the channel between Oahu and Molokai. The vessel was under full speed but as soon as the alarm was given she was brought to a stop and a search was made for the man, but the body was nowhere to be seen, and the vessel was again put on her course. Search for the man's effects was instituted but none were brought to light. From passengers it was learned that the Chinese had nothing in the way of worldly goods except the clothes upon his back. He was very sick and probably ended his life during a fit of temporary insanity.
