BUILDING IS INSANITARY

Kapiolani Home To Be Abandoned. NO FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE. Girls Will be Kept at Kalihi Receiving Station Till New Structure is Put Up.

It is likely that the Kapiolani home for girls, where the typhoid cases were discovered will be abandoned and destroyed and another site for the home selected. It was decided at the meeting of the Board of Health yesterday to keep the girls at the present at the Kalihi receiving station to which they were removed when the epidemic broke out and the question of a better location for the home will be decided on at a later meeting of the Board.

When the matter came up yesterday Dr. Wood stated to the Board that in his opinion the present location of the home was not a suitable one. "There have been no cases of leprosy in the home since its establishment," he said, "and the idea in the establishment of a home for children of leprosy parents was to take them where they would not be likely to contract the disease. The only reason the home was located in proximity to the detention camp was that there might be danger of their developing the disease and that they might not transmit it to others."

NEW HOME FAVORED. "But now that there seems no likelihood that they will any of them develop the disease it is not right to keep them in a place so near where lepers are. Besides the locality is not a healthy one and is decidedly uncomfortable as well. There is no reason why they should not be removed to a more favorable locality and I should advise that that be done."

Mr. Lowrey asked what funds there were for the erection of a new building for the home, and Dr. Garvin said that there was only the \$7,000 appropriation for their support. Mr. Lowrey thought that that might be construed to mean the erection of a home but Attorney-General Dole thought not. So it was decided to keep them for the present at the hospital of the detention camp and later to consider the matter of a new home for them.

PALOALO VALLEY DEATH. Prof. Shorey's report on the examination of the stomach of the man Kane who died at Palalo valley so mysteriously showed that he had discovered one-tenth of a grain of morphine in the stomach, but he could not say whether there had been enough in the system to kill him as it was a drug that was readily taken up by the system and he had had only the stomach to examine.

TEACHERS' HEALTH. The question of requiring school teachers to have health certificates was discussed and Secretary Wilcox was directed to look up the matter and consult with the Board of Education in regard to it. H. J. Metz appeared before the Board to tell the sanitary needs of Hilo. He said that nothing had been seen at Hilo of the excavator that had been promised and he agreed to find out what was necessary and what Hilo people would do in the way of furnishing the motive power for the excavator and the men to operate it.

LEPER SETTLEMENT. Judge John Kahina of Hanalei, reported that a child had been born to a Mrs. Forbes at the leper settlement at Kalaupapa and asked permission to have it brought away from the settlement. The matter was referred to Superintendent Reynolds. Wray Taylor, registrar of elections, asked for permission to send a commissioner to the Molokai settlement for the purpose of seeing that the residents there are registered for the coming election. It was discussed and decided that it would be advisable if possible to have some member of the settlement do the registering and Mr. Taylor will be required to confer with the Board on the matter.


