

NEW ROYAL SCHOOL BUILDING IS A MODEL OF ARCHITECTURAL BEAUTY



ROYAL SCHOOL, HONOLULU, H. T. C. W. DICKEY, ARCHITECT

THE plans for the new Royal School, to be erected on Emma street, opposite the residence of Governor Dole, are practically completed. The only hitch operating against the construction of the building itself is lack of funds. When the Legislature meets a bill will be introduced looking to the appropriation of sufficient money for erecting it.

It is proposed to make the Royal School a model one in every respect, with special attempts to make it accord with the tropical climate of Honolulu as far as practicable. The comfort of the students is one of the main features, ventilation being one of the principal factors of the architect's plans. It will be fire proof, and architecturally will stand as a monument to advanced education in the Hawaiian Islands.

C. W. Dickey, the architect, has prepared the plans and sketch. The school is to be three stories in height and will stand on the present location of the old building. It will face the lower side of the lot, the main entrance being in the center with a side entrance at either end. It will be built in the Spanish

renaissance style with broad, richly decorated eaves and suitable enrichments about the principal openings. The building is to be strictly fire-proof. The walls will be of brick or concrete, similar to those in the Stangenwald block.

No wood whatever will be employed in the construction. The only combustible material in the school when finished, will be the sash, doors and furniture. The first floor will be used for the primary grades, and the third floor for the high school. The last is to be fitted with a draughting room, commercial department and chemical and physical laboratories, with all the latest conveniences in the way of work tables, sinks, hoods, etc. On the second floor is a large assembly hall capable of accommodating all the students at one time.

The original plans for the Royal School were completed last June and contemplated a one-story wing for the manual training department, together with work shops. It was decided later that it would be better to eliminate this wing and if necessary, put in the manual training department in a separate building on account of the noise and danger of fire. The money which would have been applied on this wing has been applied to the main building to make it fire-proof. The original appropriation for the building was \$75,000, and the architect believes it can be erected for that figure.
