THEY DIED FAR AWAY NOW THEY GO HOME

THE TRANSPORT HANCOCK continued her journey to Manila yesterday. She took from here a ghastly freight—the mortal remains of thirty-four of Uncle Sam's brave boys, who received their final discharge from all earthly service in Honolulu.

Their names were signed in the muster roll of many regiments. Among them were Regular Army men, to whom fighting and campaigning in distant lands was a trade, and volunteers, some of whom had never left their homes until the day when moved by patriotic ardor or lured by the pomp of military pageantry, they enlisted.

From Minnesota ranches, from behind the counter of a New York department store, from the parlors of a great city, from a little home situated among the maples, they came, when the men of the Mainland went forth to do battle against the Don. The greater portion of the troops tarried in Honolulu a while. When they departed not a few brothers in arms were left behind. These found a home in a military hospital until they either recovered sufficiently to resume their journey or, as was the case with the thirty-four whose bodies were recently exhumed, answered the last roll call.

The New York regiment which, while stationed here, was visited with an epidemic of typhoid fever, paid the heaviest toll, losing over twenty men through the ravages of the dread disease. The battalion of Engineers, the first American soldiery to be quartered here, also lost several men, the names of two of whom, Thomas Hannon and Bernard M. Farrington, will be well remembered by many of the residents of Honolulu.

Four Hannon came to his end in a noble endeavor to rescue a man killed by contact with a live wire on King street. He was buried in the Catholic burying ground.

Farrington succumbed to typhoid fever in the improvised hospital at Independence Park. His death was deeply regretted by his comrades. The best soldier in his company, Farrington's dashing demeanor and perennial geniality made him a prime favorite at Camp McKinley.

It was a hot, dusty afternoon when he was laid to rest, and all the members of his company and the majority of those of other companies gathered around his grave to pay their last earthly homage to one they had loved so well. The funeral was conducted with full military honors, and at the conclusion of the ceremony "taps" were sounded and the speeding volleys fired.

Soon after the sound of the sod dropping on the casket had died away, the campward march was begun and the men of the Engineers left their dead brother sleeping in sleep that knows no awakening, under a fragrant, white-blossoming oleander bush.

And now they are going home again! They who boarded the transport with elastic step and with the bloom of health on their cheeks are going back to the old home. They will be interred, many of them, in a sleepy country graveyard, where they played as boys. The same moon will haunt the white stones of sepulchre and the same sweet stars will look down on God's acre and maybe recognize the presence of him who lived and trusted them in the days when his life was hardy begun.

To their resting places in the flesh of the day will come aged mothers and sisters who will tend their boy's grave as a garden and make the grass to grow greenly o'er it with many tears. On Decoration Day the veterans will linger to do them honor, and the spot will be brightened with an abundance of beautiful flowers.

They started for the war and succumbed in a battle with Death, when their self-sought task had barely begun. They have tarried here a long, long time beneath the shadow of the palms. Now their journeying has recommenced, but the miles of their wandering are numbered.

They are going home.
