HUMANITY OF THE BOER GENERALS

J. J. Turner Contradicts Some English Statements as to the War.

Editor Advertiser: Since I have been on my way from the Transvaal to Honolulu I have often picked up various papers, both American and British, and I am sorry to say I find many untruths with regard to the Boer war. As an instance, I take the opportunity of placing one false report before the public, which appeared in a paper styled "South Africa." It appears as coming directly from Sir Alfred Milner, and he charges the Boers with luring British officers on to death through the use of the white flag; also of using explosive bullets.

Now I have been through Natal and the Orange Free State and I can say truthfully I never saw anything of the kind; while, on the other hand, I am prepared to prove that the explosive bullets and dum-dums were used not by us but by the British. After the battle of Sanna's Post I took from one prisoner thirty-two explosive and dum-dum cartridges. I gave the American military attaché one, the Norwegian attaché one, and some to a few correspondents.

As to the white flag, why, there was at the time a continual kick on our side in all our camps regarding the free use of the white flag by the British officers. My chief reason for putting this in print is simply to do justice to those who deserve it.

Many suggestions were put to Krueger, Joubert and other officials, such as using dynamite mines, throwing dynamite into Ladysmith by means of kites, etc., by some of the foreigners, but the answer was always the same, "We will not resort to cowardly acts, but will fight with our trusty Mausers until we are beaten." I know of one case where General Dela Rey once told a man named Greer that if he opened his mouth once more to put forth such dastardly suggestions he would promptly be sent to Pretoria as a nuisance.

In concluding I have only to say that the war stands as it does owing to the ignorance and simplicity displayed by the Boer Generals of the modern tracks of warfare. To prove this one has only to look back to the generosity of Joubert and others in granting armistices whenever asked, and Kitchener's return gratitude when asked by Cronje for twenty-four hours to bury his dead. "No," said Kitchener, "This day I must crush you once and for all!"

Change in Bank Managers.

Norman Halstead, who has been connected with the First American Bank of Hawaii in this city for some time, will leave on the Kinau Tuesday for Hilo, where he will assume charge of the branch bank established there by the First American Bank, at present managed by Major Purdy. The latter will come to Honolulu as soon as the transfer of the bank's affairs is completed.
