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HORSES TO RACE TODAY

Meeting on at the Kapiolani Park.

PURSES FOR WINNERS

Meeting of the Honolulu Driving Association Last Night Arranges It.

Crowded meeting of the Hawaiian Driving Association was held last night at the Hawaiian Club.

Mr. Ayres was elected secretary of the occasion, in place of Mr. Moore.

It was decided to hold races this afternoon at Kapiolani Park, commencing at 1 o'clock. The following is the program and order in which the races will be run:

Two-mile dash for maidens; first \$100, second \$25.

Five-furlong dash, free for all; first \$100, second \$25.

Three-furlong dash, Hawaiian breeds; first \$100, second \$25.

Five-furlong dash, free for all; first \$125, second \$25.

Three-mile dash to the secretary at 9 o'clock at the Club Stables.

Withdrawals must be made to the secretary at 1 o'clock at the track.

The officials will be as follows: J. W. McDonald, Captain; J. Shaw, starter; Dr. Monahan, veterinarian; Frank Kruger, W. S. Moore, saddling paddock; Dr. Chapman, clerk of the course; H. M. Ayres, referee; Ferris and Seth Nichols, known jockeys, under the official name of "reinstated," it being a good authority in the case of the latter that he had never been off the turf in California, but was reinstated for alleged suspicious conduct.

The motion of Mr. Nichols, a vote of thanks was passed to the Hilo racing for the active interest they have shown in racing in Honolulu.

The latest reports from the track are exceedingly satisfactory. The track was harrowed yesterday, and the horses are in good shape for the gallopers.

There have already been received \$1000 from Messrs. Wilson, McKensie, Dee, Moore, Andrews, Cunningham, and many others. It is expected that over twenty different purses will be offered this afternoon.

The Saturday afternoon following will be devoted to the following: one-quarter mile, running, first \$100, second \$25.

Five-furlong dash, Hawaiian breeds; first \$100, second \$25.

Three-furlong dash, trotting and pacing; first \$100, second \$25.

Five-furlong dash, trotting and pacing; first \$100, second \$25.

Cunningham's Tom Ryder, Fred Eros and Mongoose.

Antidote, Amarino and Lawrence H will chase for the money in the six furlongs for Hawaiian breeds. The battle between the old rivals will be worth going miles to witness.

Official program with entries, weights, colors, etc., will be on sale at the grounds. W. G. Rowland has charge of them.

The meeting looks like being one of the most enjoyable ever held in the Islands.

Naples, who farmed several races here and at Hilo during the summer, ran eighth in a field of ten in a six-furlong race at Oakland, on the 17th instant. The mare started at odds of 50 to 1 against, and ran prominently for three furlongs. The track was holding and destroyed whatever chance of winning she might have possessed.

Naples will yet surprise the talent when running in a field of poor horses and on a fast track.

Jimmy Logue rode the winner of the Alameda handicap run at Oakland on the 19th instant. The price was 50 to 1, and his mount, Grand Sachem, made a runaway race of it. The winner carried the feather of 92 pounds.

J. R. Wilson says that he will keep his string here for the Christmas Day races providing the local owners will ship to Hilo in anything like decent numbers. In that case he will ship with the Honolulu consignment, which will leave for Hilo on the 26th of December. Mr. Wilson says that it is about up to Honolulu to send a few horses to Hilo, and further states that if the local owners fail in this respect he will never again send a horse to the metropolitan track.

The New Year meeting promises to be a hummer. There will be no dearth of horses, as, in addition to the representatives of the big Hawaii stables, presided over by Messrs. Wilson, Horner, Rodiak and others, there is every probability of many home horses being sent to the half mile track. Gay, of Kauai, it is understood, will send over some of his recently imported horses, from the Garden Isle, to try conclusions at the Second City track. The reputation for liberality enjoyed by the Hilo executive will do much to draw a record crowd of horses.

Horner's "Idie" boy, considered by many to be the best Hawaiian bred in the Islands, will be started at the Hilo meeting.

Bob Burns is on the way here with Naples and Socialist.

Campus, Everett and Dividends, owned by Messrs. Wilson and Rooker, will be campaigned at the Coast until further notice. The former is expected to win many races when judiciously placed. Everett is being schooled over the jumps, and is doing so well that an offer of \$400 was recently made for him by an Englishman, who was getting together a stable of jumpers to take to Venezuela and England.

J. R. Wilson and Mr. Rooker won the best sum of \$2,000 over their horse, Campus, which recently got home at the juicy odds of 40 to 1. Wilson had \$20 on and Rooker \$10, and they played their horse across the board. Wilson says that he might just as well have won \$40,000, as the bookmakers would have none of Campus, and lengthened the odds rather than cutting them, after the combination played their money.

Billy Cunningham has just received from the Coast a very handsome sporting souvenir in the shape of a clock and barometer elegantly mounted amid an artistically designed collection of stirrups, whips, racing colors and other turf paraphernalia. A number of old time English racing prints came with the chromometrical-astronomical combination.

W. H. Cornwell is thinking of sending Venus to California and mating her with one of the aristocratic sires, either Brutus, St. Carlo or Watercross.

Ahuimanu is now racing at the San Francisco tracks under a new name. On her first essay she was probably nothing but a "feeler," however, and the filly will doubtless be heard from at no very distant date.

W. H. Cunningham intends to offer \$500 for a race called the Indra Stakes, to be competed for by three-year-olds of Indra's get. The race will be run in 1904. Indra, who is owned by Mr. Cunningham, is by Hindoo out of Junita, and is one of the best bred horses in America. During his eight years of racing he finished first in twenty-two occasions; second, fourteen, and third, nine times. Among the many famous horses Indra has beaten are Iola,

Speculation, Longhook, Sutton, Sunburst, Pepper, Newgatherer, David Tenny, Cash Day, Charley Christy and Hoheczollern. Indra is as sound as the proverbial bell.

DRAFTING THE CITY CHARTER

Republicans and Independents Plan for Men To Do It.

At a conference of Republicans yesterday there were present the following: T. McCants Stewart, presiding; H. P. Baldwin, A. F. Gillilan, W. C. Achi, W. J. Coelho, C. H. Dickey, C. L. Crabbe, Cecil Brown, Jonah Kumalae, Wm. Aylett, A. G. M. Robertson, Wm. Hoos, J. P. Cooke and E. R. Hendry.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: It is the sense of this conference that the executive committee of the Republican party of Hawaii appoint a committee of thirty members from among the representative citizens of this city, none of whom shall be a member of the Legislature, and that they form a charter for the city of Honolulu to be submitted to the Legislature as a Republican measure.

The executive committee will probably meet at the end of the week to consider the resolution.

The following resolution was adopted by the executive committee of the Independents:

Resolved, That the executive committees of the Republican and Democratic parties be invited to join with that of the Home Rule party in the selecting of a committee of thirty free holders of the city of Honolulu in proportion as follows:

Twelve to be appointed by the Republican central committee, six to be appointed by the Democratic central committee and twelve by the Home Rule committee.

The committee as appointed, to draft a charter for the city of Honolulu, to be submitted to the Legislature in February, 1901.

Resolved, That upon receiving notice of the acceptance of this proposal for the selection of committees the Home Rule committee fix a day for convening the committee on charter.

Resolved, That no member of the Legislature shall serve on the above named committee.
