Boxholders to RETURN ALL KEYS

The Postmaster Will Return Twenty Cents for Each One.

Postmaster Oat posted the following notice yesterday:

"In accordance with the postal regulations, section 604, boxholders in the Honolulu postoffice are hereby notified to present their keys for redemption and resissue at United States rates, for ten days between December 19 and 28th, inclusive.

Chief Clerk Kenake said yesterday that they proposed to start in this morning to redeem all keys formerly issued by the Hawaiian Government for the use of boxholders. Under the former government the holders of boxes were required to deposit fifty cents for each key when they rented a box.

The United States government will call them in, register the key number, and return them again to the users, together with a refund of thirty cents. The federal government requires a deposit of only twenty cents for keys. All the keys for each box must be brought in at the same time. For instance, if there are two keys in use for one box, both must be presented at the same time. The same keys will be returned to the boxholders, but the numbers have to be recorded in the United States blanks.
